AUBURN — The devotion of the Forty Hours will open in St. Hyacinth's Church on Sunday, October 5, and will close on Tuesday, October 7. A Franciscan Missionary Father from Elkton City, Maryland will preside over the services at the devotion.

Children in Diocesan Schools Account For \$50,000 in War Bonds

SAVANNAH, Ga. — Children in parochial schools of the Diocese of Savannah-Atlanta purchased or caused to be purchased \$50,000 worth of war bonds and stamps in the closing months of the last school year, according to the Rt. Rev. Msgr. T. James McNamara, Diocesan Superintendent of Schools.

"The program set up in the schools," Monsignor McNamara said, "has a two-fold objective to teach them democratic processes and to enable them in a very practical way to have part in the Government's war effort. All sorts of means of raising money for the purchase of bonds and stamps are used, such as the collection and sale of paper, clothes hangers, etc."
