Are all the doctrines of the Church founded upon the scriptures?

Not all the Catholic doctrines are to be found in the Bible. But none of them is opposed to any teaching of Scripture. Some Catholic doctrines are found directly recorded in Scripture, others are logically derived from teachings there others are founded upon di-

vine tradition. Scripture itself guarantees divine tradition to be a sound source of doctrine. Thus St. Paul wrote to the Thessalonians: "Brethren, stand fast, and hold the tradition which you have learned, whether by word or by our epistle." The traditions which the early Christians learned by word, and which were not included in the New Testament writings have been preserved in the Catholic Church.

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Library Plan Installed At Nazareth College

New Library Plan

A new system of book selections has been commenced at the college library. The plan, which is the result of the work of Dr. Randall of the Chicago University Library, is being tried out for the first time. The plan groups the faculty members under four headings and divides into two unequal portions. Each year one of the groups has charge of the major portions for the purchase of books by its selection.

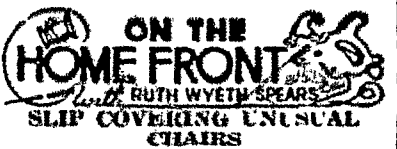
Dr. Abell of the History Department is chairman of the group using the major portion of the book fund, this year. Dr. Abell has also been instrumental in securing the donation of "Chronicles of America" from the members of his history class.

During the year the college has received large donations from private libraries. The donations include 600 volumes of books from the collection of the late Archbishop Thomas F. Hickey, about 700 volumes from a bequest left to St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira, of which the college has become sharers, and 40 volumes from the Rev. Dr. Owen E. McGuire, of St. Joseph's Hospital. Sister Teresa Marie has also given the library several valuable books from the library by 2,000 volumes, bringing the total to over 20,000 volumes.

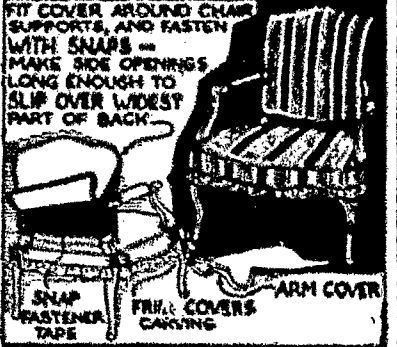
War Aid Classes

... the substantial striped cotton material chosen harmonizes perfectly with the rather elegant lines of the chair frame. If you have an especially difficult chair to cover, you will save time by fitting a muslin pattern first. Then you can snip until it fits perfectly around arms and other supports and, if you make a mistake in the pattern, just stitch a patch over it and start over again. Before removing the pattern from the chair, plan the openings so that they will lap neatly and be sure they are long enough. In the finished cover either bindings or facings may be used for irregular edges.

In the early days of the Rochester Diocesan Council, a series of Conferences on Peace was held at the Catholic Women's Club under the direction of Miss Anna Dill Gamble of York, Pa., who has recently received from Our Holy Father the decoration "Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice." She writes: "I have happy memories of my visit to Rochester. When I remember how we worked for peace, and how little we were able to do to prevent this war, I am convinced that we did not pray enough. Only prayer now can save our civilization. But somehow I am convinced that the world will now, after the war, turn to the Church for the solution of its social problems. That is, of course, if we Catholics desire it enough."

In addition to all the splendid work for the Red Cross and for defense carried on by the Catholic Women's Club, Miss Agnes LaVelle, Membership Secretary of the Club, reports a sale of \$3,000 in Bonds and War Saving Stamps since March 17 of this year.

At the request of President Roosevelt, Fire Prevention Week is being observed this year October 4 to 10. Rochester War Council and the Fire Prevention Committee of the Chamber of Commerce are sponsoring this campaign locally, carrying out the theme that fire is sabotage.

These points will be stressed this year: 1. To urge residents to visit their neighborhood firehouse and receive proper instruction in the control of incendiary bombs. (A recent survey of 30,000 Rochesterians showed that only 30 percent had taken advantage of this education.)

2. To inaugurate the recruiting of fire watchers. Both men and women may be enrolled and their duties will be to take up posts at vantage points during an "alert" and report fires started by falling incendiary bombs. There is no age limit and citizens are urged to register at the Civic Exhibits Building in Main Street West.

THREE-YEAR WANDERINGS OF REFUGEE FAMILY ENDS AS MOTHER REACHES U. S.

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. — Three years of perilous wanderings ended for a refugee Czech-Slovak family when the mother of the family arrived here by airplane from Panama. She was greeted by the Rev. William Moore, representing the Bureau of Immigration, National Catholic Welfare Conference, who assisted in arranging for the last lap of her journey to join her husband and daughter in Talmadge, O.

The wanderings were those of the Robitchek family. They started with the flight of the family from Czechoslovakia in 1939 at the outbreak of the war. They drew to a close as Mrs. Libuse Robitchek's plane arrived in Brownsville. She was met by the representative of the N. C. W. C. Immigration Bureau at the request of the President's Advisory Committee handling emergency refugee cases.

A ship on which the Robitcheks sought passage to the New World was forced to put in at a West African port. Two periods of six months were then spent in concentration camps. And then a ship on which they were taken aboard with other refugees sailed the seas for two years, denied entrance to many ports, before the Robitcheks were landed somewhere in the West Indies. Their experiences — father, mother and 11-year-old daughter — included two sinkings by submarines and rescues at sea.

Eventually they reached Panama with only enough funds to buy one adult and one half-fare ticket to the United States. The father had a position as a chemical engineer awaiting him in Ohio. He took the daughter with him. Now they are being reunited.

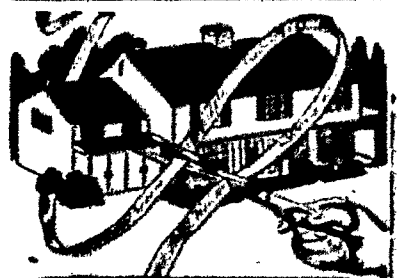
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
