CYA Called Safeguard For Youth As Campaign Opens

Campaigners in the Columbus Youth Association membership drive face a busy week-end in an eleventh hour attempt to reach and surpass the 2,500 goal.

The semi-final report meeting is scheduled for this evening in the ballroom of the Columbus Civic Center and campaign leaders were hopeful that the report would end the current total well past the half-way mark.

First reports from the campaign-ers indicated that a large percentage of the memberships will go to deserving boys and girls. This is in line with the admonition given the workers by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney Bishop of Rochester, at the opening dinner last Thursday.

Bishop Kearney pointed out the necessity of continuing the activities of such institutions as the Columbus Youth Association in time of war and held it up as a community safeguard against the spread of juvenile delinquency.

The Women's Division under the direction of Miss Flora Armbruster, took a commanding lead over their rivals from the Men's Division at the first report meeting Monday

evening, turning in a total of 167 memberships against 66 for the men. The special committee, headed by John D. Hayes, reported an even 400 memberships to bring the total to 633 members or 26 percent of the total.

Group totals in the women's division included Mrs. Joseph Kaseman, 36, Mrs. Robert Taylor, 8; Miss Laura Schilling, 72, and Miss Helen Welch, 60. In the men's group, the teams led by Walter Sullivan totaled 29 members while 29 were turned in by Rufus Maler and his men, 10 by Frank M. Beaucaire and seven by the teams under T. Harold McCabe.

One team, captained by Miss Pearl Boldt went over the top on the first night with 21 memberships for 105 percent of its quota. The team piloted by Elmer Humes reported 10 memberships for 50 percent of its quota to top all teams in the men's division which is being directed by W. Raymond Whitley.

Jesuit Discusses War Before Rotary Club

That war is not essentially an evil and there may be times when war must be waged was emphasized by the Rev. Michael J. Ahern, S. J., member of the National Conference of Christians and Jews in a talk to the Rotary Club, Tuesday.

The distinguished Jesuit scientist stressed the duty of a nation to wage war especially when the life of a nation is in danger or a nation is unjustly attacked.

Conditions in Germany were discussed by Father Ahern who pointed out how the Nazi regime had gone after the thousands of Jews in an open manner but had used different tactics in handling the 22,000,000 Catholics. He cited the Nazi technique of working on the Catholic schools, forbidding them to take any more pupils and other attempts at attacking the Catholic religion undercover.

The speaker had high praise for Dr. Niemöller, the Lutheran minister who defied the Nazis and recounted the work of Cardinal Faulhaber and Bishop von Galen in the cause for religious freedom in the Reich. He said the only forces opposing the Nazis were the Religious Forces of Protestants, Jews and Catholics in the Reich.
