Cameraman Awarded Military Medal

LONDON—Official army press photographer Capt. Geoffrey Keating, who worked the *Catholic* papers here before he joined the Daily Sketch and became one of Fleet-street's star operators, has won the Military Cross in Libya.

The commander of the tank regiment to which Capt. Keating is attached says "Capt. Keating was a great help, for he could always tell the commanding officer what was happening on the front. The troops were astonished at the gallant way in which he brought his unarmored vehicle up to the leading tanks."

Mr. Keating joined the army on

a private before he was given a commission as captain. He has taken pictures in France and Germany and was wounded in Libya some months ago.

He is a son of the late Miss Keating, member of the old Irish party in the British House of Commons.

Institute At De Sales High

GENEVA—A two-day Sodality Institute sponsored by De Sales High School Sodality for the entire student body was concluded on Friday afternoon at the school. Rev. Martin Carrabine, S. J., was leader of the conference, the first day of which was devoted to the seniors and juniors, and the second day to the sophomores and freshmen.

"Integrated, all-out uncompromising Catholicism alone is adequate armor for fighting in the present crisis," Father Carrabine told the students. "Totalitarians of the right and left must be met by a sane but radical totalitarians of the middle. The Sodality keeps us constantly aware of this pressing need by showing us the bravest and holiest totalitarians of Christ—His mother Mary."

Father Carrabine of Chicago re-

ceived his degree of A. B. and M. A. from Gonzaga University, Spokane, Washington, and entered the Jesuit Order at Florissant, Missouri in 1912. He has been instructor of Classics at St. Mary's College, St. Mary's, Kansas, and instructor in English and Classics at St. John's College, Seino, British Honduras. He was named regional secretary of the Sodality, which includes students of all Catholic High Schools, in 1934.

The De Sales High School Sodality like all other Sodalities in the Catholic High Schools of the country is devoted to honoring the Blessed Mother of Christ.

Referring to the winning of the war and the winning of the peace, Father Carrabine called upon the students to live up to the tenets of the faith and it would follow naturally that they be good citizens of their country.

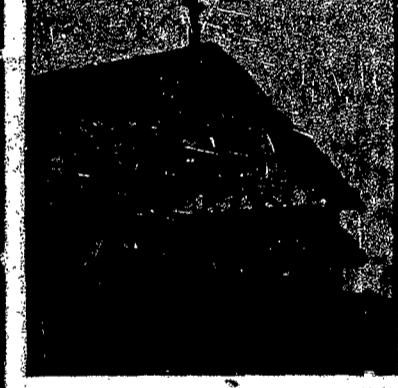
