Bishop Decrees Interdict When Errors Are Noticed For Opposing Gambling Law

Providence Arms

Carroll P. Harrington, Bishop of Providence, decreed a general interdict of five days validity to begin at 12 o'clock noon on Saturday, Oct. 12, 1942, to end at 12 o'clock noon on Sunday, Oct. 13, 1942.

The interdict covers the entire state of Rhode Island excepting the territories of Pawtucket and the town of Cranston.

It is directed against the continuation of gambling and the enforcement of a gambling statute at Chappaqua.

The Chamber of Commerce of the Province of Chappaqua entered the petition of the two editors of the legislature, calling for the same, charging them with intent to violate the Chamber's prerogative.

Both editors denied the charge and said they had no knowledge of the action.

Argentine Catholic Action and other organizations have addressed messages to Bishop Carroll, asking him to extend the interdict to cover the entire state.

Word was received in Auburn on Friday of the death of Rev. Thomas J. Timmons which occurred at the rectory of St. Margaret's Church, Buffalo.

Father Timmons is a native of Auburn and a friend of the pastor of St. Mary's Church. He observed his 75th birthday last Friday. Father Timmons had been in full health for the past two years. He was a graduate of St. Mary's Preparatory School and the Auburn High School.
