Chosen as a sequel to that success, "The Milky Way" again features Clarence Flass of the Fall's fame as the quiet little milk peddler turned pugilistic. Supporting him will be

Centenary of Owego Parish

By MARY C. ROSNAN OWEGO -- The one hundredth anniversary of the founding of St. Patrick's Parish was fittingly observed on Sunday when the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, celebrated a Pontifical High Mass at 11 o'clock.

Scores of Non-Catholic friends of the Parish joined with the parishioners in attending the service until every available seat in the spacious edifice was taken and chairs were placed in the aisle and back of the church to accommodate those who arrived late. Many, unable to obtain seats, stood in the rear of the church, throughout the entire service. Many of the priests from nearby parishes were present at the Mass.

Following the announcements for the week, Father Michael J. Hynes, pastor expressed his sincere appreciation for the large attendance, both on the part of the members of the Parish and those of the various other faiths of the village. He stated that the great effort made by the Most Reverend Bishop and other clergymen to attend the services was realized and deeply appreciated. Father Hynes also thanked the members of the Village Board, the Board of Education and all other local authorities for the splendid co-operation shown in carrying out the plans for the Centenary.

The Bishop heartily congratulated the members of the Parish on the achievement and stated that, only through hard work and sacrifice during the many years had the eventful day arrived. He related the many hardships and struggles that were endured by the priests and parishioners. He said that his prayer and hope, today, were that the present members of the congregation would remember the early sacrifices of the founders of the parish and that they

carry on so that the next generation might be able to look back with pride and honor on the accomplishments of those supporting St. Patrick's Parish.

Father Hynes was the recipient of many letters of congratulations from various groups and friends throughout the village. Among those was a most sincere letter from the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Paul's Episcopal Church and one from the Village of Council of Churches. The latter letter was signed by the Rev. Edgar Frank, pastor of the First Presbyterian Union Church as president and the Rev. Theodore L. Conklin, pastor of the First Baptist Church, secretary. It recalled that throughout the years a friendly feeling had existed between the members of St. Patrick's Parish and the members of the churches of other denominations of the village and the letter stated that at no time, was that feeling more sound than at the present time and this was due, undoubtedly, to the splendid co-operation on the part of Father Hynes to join in all worth-while aims for the advancement of the spiritual good of the citizens of Owego. The letter from the St. Paul's Church said that the success of St. Patrick's Parish had been attained through the hard labor and devotion of the many conscientious priests throughout the years. The members of St. Paul's Parish, through the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen, expressed the hope that Father Hynes might be able to service the present parish and the community for many years to come.
