

Diocese Joins In 'Mission Sunday' Observance

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Fr. Randall Named To Courier Staff

Appointment by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, president of the CATHOLIC COURIER, of the Rev. John S. Randall as managing editor to succeed the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, pastor of St. Patrick's Church, is announced today.

Due to pressure of parish duties, Father Mooney found it impossible to continue in his capacity on the diocesan newspaper and submitted his resignation in that office. He has faithfully served in that capacity since the reorganization of the diocesan organ in 1932 and during that time had a large part in the development and progress of the paper.

Father Randall is the diocesan director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith and will continue in that office. He succeeded Father Mooney in that office on Feb. 7, 1938.

FR. PATRICK CLEARY TO SPEAK ON FAR EAST MISSION

World-wide Mission Sunday will be observed in all the churches of the Diocese of Rochester on Sunday, Oct. 18, at 11 A. M. From the pulpits of the churches an appeal will be made for spiritual and material aid for the Catholic missionaries in mission fields at home and abroad.

The observance in Rochester will be solemnized by a Solemn Mass offered coram Episcopo in the Pro-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart. The Mass will be celebrated by the Rev. Dr. Edward J. Byrne of St. Bernard Seminary. Assisting Dr. Byrne will be the Rev. Dr. Edward Lintz, Deacon; Very Rev. John O'Loane, C.S.B., Subdeacon; Rev. Lawrence E. Casey and Very Rev. Edward Lyons, Masters of Ceremonies. The Rev. Joseph O'Connell and the Rev. James McAniff will serve as Chaplains to His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney. Minor offices will be filled by students of St. Andrew's Seminary. Music for the Mass will be rendered by a St. Bernard Seminary Schola under the direction of the Rev. Benedict A. Thomson, Professor of Sacred Chant.

Maryknoll To Preach

The preacher for the occasion will be the Rev. Patrick Cleary of the Maryknoll Order. A native of Illinois, Father Cleary has served for twenty years in the missions and has worked especially among the mission stations of Korea. Along with other Maryknoll priests and Sisters, Father Cleary returned aboard the repatriation ship, the Gripsholm.

A student delegation from the Crusade Units of the Seminary, Colleges, High Schools, Commercial Schools and School of Nursing will be present.

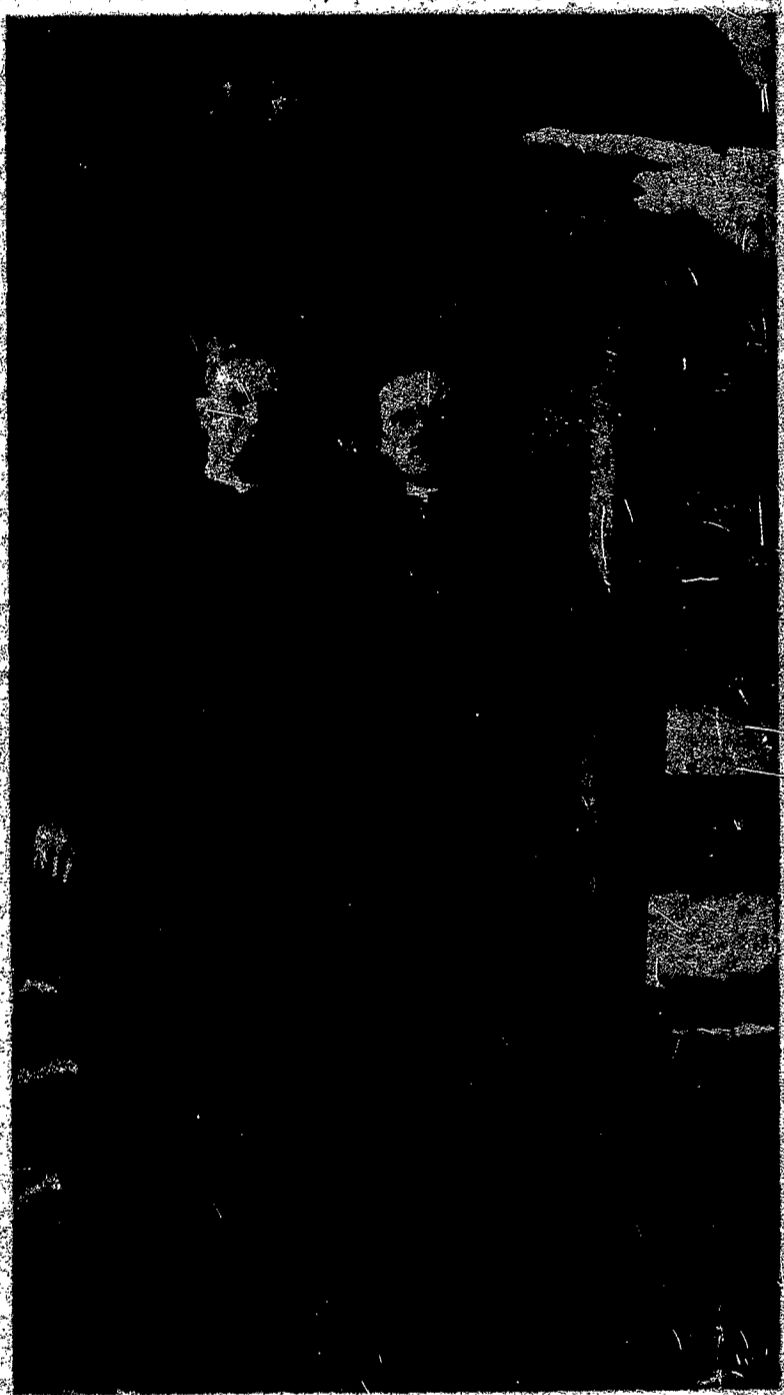
Kindra Observance

New Air Raid Rules For Schools Issued

The Rev. John M. Duffy, Superintendent of Schools, issued to school authorities this week new air raid instructions. Deviating from those which have been employed in the past, the new plans are in accordance with directions received from General William M. Haskell, Director of New York State Office of Civilian Protection, and will control the conduct of all children attending Catholic elementary schools in Rochester.

Effective at once, orders call for a general dismissal on the "Yellow" signal only; or an air raid shelter move on the "blue" or "red" signal. Ordinarily there will be a lapse of 15 minutes between the "Yellow" and "Blue" and 30 or 35 minutes between the "Yellow" and "Red." Military authorities admit that under some conditions the "Blue" or "Red" signal may be the first alarm.

For the dismissal type drill, children bound for home will be designated in "Divisions" according to the general location of their homes, and subdivided into "Groups" according to streets and neighborhoods. A teacher will be in charge of each Division and an older boy or girl will captain each group on its way home.

Parents or guardians are required to notify in writing the principal of the school the destination of his or her child which may be other than the home address. If a child lives too far from the school to reach home within a 20 or 25 minute period, and the parent or guardian wishes that child to remain in the school, that fact should also be made known in writing to the principal.

In the event of a school drill, the radios will give an "All-Clear" signal and children are directed to return to school for the next regular session.

Should children still be on the street when the general alarm is sounded, they are directed to take shelter in the nearest home or building.

It is urgently demanded that parents should not call the school in the midst of an air raid drill to leave the telephone lines clear for signals. They can be assured that their children will be well cared for by school personnel.
