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Fr. Patrick Cleary Is Mission Day Guest At St. Bernard Seminary

"The Sacred Heart for the world, the world for the Sacred Heart!" That was the rallying cry as the students of St. Bernard's Seminary conducted their annual Mission Day, Oct. 8.

The Rev. Patrick Cleary, M.M., a native of Kansas, who has labored for nineteen years in the mission fields of Korea, was the guest of the St. Bernard's unit of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade. Father Cleary began the Mission Day observance by celebrating Mass at the high altar of the Seminary chapel. Afterwards he addressed the Seminarians on the condition of the Catholic Church in Korea.

At the end of the meeting, the students paraded to the spacious field adjoining the Seminary where the members of the Fourth Theology class conducted a banquet for the benefit of the missions.

The meeting of the mission society, which was held in the auditorium of the Seminary, was opened by Rev. Mr. Michael L. Darcy, the president. Mr. Darcy outlined the day's activities and introduced Father Cleary to the students. The missionary, who has just returned from the Orient, told of the present state of the Catholic Church in Korea, and also gave a brief description of his recent return to America aboard the S. S. Gripsholm. Father Cleary declared that the Korean converts make excellent Catholics, and are at present in the hands of a well trained native clergy. He expressed the hope that peace may soon be restored, so that he and his fellow missionaries may return to their posts.

Moderator Speaks

The Rev. Edward J. Byrne, Ph. D., S.T.D., professor of Sacred Scripture at the Seminary and moderator of the St. Bernard's unit also addressed the meeting. Dr. Byrne urged the students carry a missionary zeal into their future priestly work. He declared that it is the duty of priests, and future priests to assist their missionary colleagues by material support and, what is more important, by their prayers. Dr. Byrne announced that upon his request the Central Office of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade in Cincinnati had awarded the rank and insignia of Paladin Leader on the Rev. Anthony Gomez of New Bedford, Mass., former president of the seminary unit. Dr. Byrne invested Father Gomez with the insignia and cited the reasons for the bestowal of the honor. He declared that the former president had manifested extraordinary zeal while in office, contributing greatly to the success of the C. S. M. C. convention which was held in Rochester in June, 1941.

Alumni Returns

Led by the Mission Unit banner, the students marched to the field where the banquet was being held. During the day the Seminarians visited the various booths which were under the care of the Fourth Theologians. Many priests from Rochester and other dioceses, all graduates of the Seminary, returned to participate in the celebration and to renew student acquaintanceships. A softball game between students and alumni was held during the afternoon. The undergraduates won by a 3-2 score.

The financial returns of the 1942 Mission Day have not yet been completely tabulated. However, Mr. Darcy has declared that it was a great success and the results will probably exceed those of former years. Dr. Byrne likewise has congratulated the Seminarians, declaring that this Mission Day was "one of the finest, possibly the best, in the history of the society."
