Reopen Catholic Labor College October 16

Reopening of the Rochester Catholic Labor College for its fourth consecutive term was announced this week by the Rev. George C. Vogt, director of the Diocesan Confraternity of Christian Doctrine and college director.

First class will be held at 8 p. m. Friday, Oct. 16, at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, 403 South Ave. Father Vogt stated.

Fundamental principles underlying labor-management relations will be the subject for this year's course, which will be divided into 12 once-weekly classes, with six of the classes scheduled in October and November and the remaining six after the New Year. "We invite anyone interested in the labor-industry problem to attend these classes," Father Vogt said. "No one who follows the times can doubt the importance of this subject. There is no charge for the classes and only a nominal fee for registration."

Speakers will be invited to conduct forums on the subject during the course, the priest added. Members of labor unions, he noted, are especially invited to the classes.
