THE NEW MOVIES

Editor's Note: Listed as Class B, objectionable in part, by the National Legion of Decency, this week: "The Moon and Sixpence," objection: "The film contains scenes of paintings which are classified as obscene material. A suggestive sequence, 'The divorcee from the main character is so presented as to appear justified.' 'Sin Town'; objection: 'Sympathy is evoked for wrong doing.'"

Three out of the five movies of the week are rated as "objectionable in part" by the Legion of Decency—and the principal objection is "light treatment of marriage." In at least two of these films marriage is regarded as something to be jumped into quickly and to be broken up as suddenly with the first disagreement. Both of them are trashy trivia of the pulp magazine school. The third picture, "The Moon and Sixpence," is a more serious and thoughtful study but through exceptional acting, writing and direction make the principal character believable they cannot cause his actions to be condoned. It does not seem at all implausible to think that a picture might be made about people with a normal married life. How about a try, Hollywood.

"The Moon and Sixpence"—B

Distinctive handling in every department of its production makes absorbing adult screen fare of the motion picture version of Somerset Maugham's "The Moon and Sixpence." It is the second and last production of the Loew-Lewin company which also produced "S. Ends Our Night." In addition Albert Lewin the co-producer is also responsible for the screen play and the direction.

The technique he uses is some what reminiscent of "Citizen Kane," with the life of an even more unpleasant man shown through the eyes of various people with whom he comes into contact. It is searching character study, heightened by the performance of George Sanders who plays Charles Strickland.

Strickland is a stodgy somewhat dull person who suddenly rebels against the conventions of his life

He leaves his wife for no other reason than that he wants to paint and is tired of his life with her. The desertion of his children bothers him not at all. He goes to Paris, lives in squalor, is insulting to the few persons who would offer him friendship. He becomes ill and when he is almost dead, is taken in by Stroeve, a Dutch painter, whom he has treated with contempt. Stroeve and his wife nurse Strickland back to health. In return, Strickland takes Stroeve's wife with him when he goes but later deserts her and is responsible for her suicide. And he's just started at that point. George Sanders' strong characterization spares nothing in painting a graphic portrait of Strickland. It is an uncompromising study of a strange man.

There is another excellent piece of acting by Steve Geray as Stroeve in a role that might easily have been overdone. Herbert Marshall and Albert Basserman, moving principally as narrators, do capable jobs, and Molly Lamont has an effective bit. Elena Verdugo makes a flowerlike native girl and Florence Bates furnishes sturdy support. Doris Dudley, alone of cast principals, seems strained and self-conscious in her playing.

The picture is rated "objectionable in part" by the Legion of Decency for the reasons mentioned at the top of this column. But, for the most part, its story has been handled without any attempt to gild the character or condone the actions of Charles Strickland.

"Orchestra Wives"—B

Among the most popular songs of the day are the melodic "Serenade in Blue," the tuneful "At Last" and the novelty, "Kalamazoo," and the fact that they are all played by Glenn Miller's band in "Orchestra Wives," guarantees the picture to the five fans.

Unfortunately in between song numbers, there is an exceptionally juvenile story about a small town girl who falls for a handsome trumpeter marries him in a hurry and then goes through the usual triangle melodramatics, with the

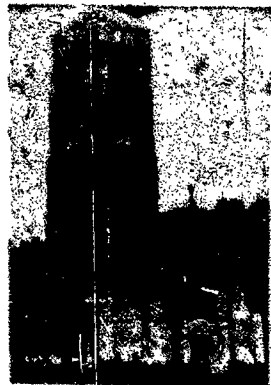
