**MILWAUKEE** - (UPI) - American Catholics in action in the Southwest Pacific area "are showing up as wonderful Catholics." Father Austin J. Henry, Army chaplain formerly of St. Call's Church here, writes in a letter that reached Milwaukee ten days after it was mailed.

Father Henry does not mention where he is now stationed. He was mentioned in radio dispatches from Australia several weeks ago.

"I am mighty happy and proud to say that our men are showing up as wonderful Catholics under this ordeal," Father Henry states.

They go to Mass on Sunday and receive the Sacraments.

"Last Sunday I had Mass at 8 A. M., then moved two miles down the road and had another at 11 A. M. In the afternoon I went to a third unit and had Mass at 4 P. M. I heard confessions before each Mass."

Father Henry states that he also tributes 20 copies each Sunday of The Milwaukee Catholic, official organ of the Milwaukee Archdiocese, and that each copy is "read from cover to cover every time." He is assigned to a unit composed entirely of men from Wisconsin.
