AUBURN — The Sodality year for St. Mary's officially opened on Tuesday evening when the Junior Sodality met in Lyceum Hall. Preceding the meeting the Sodality members attended October Devotions in the church, offering their prayers for the members of the parish who are enrolled with Uncle Sam.

Rev. Dennis W. Hickey, assistant pastor at St. Mary's, is moderator of the Sodality and the officers for the year 1942-1943 are: President, Elizabeth Bradley; Vice-president, Lorraine Bradley; secretary, Frances Mallon and treasurer, Rita Burns. Membership in the Junior Sodality is limited to girls of high school age.

St. Mary's Sodality has always adhered strictly to the plan formulated by the Sodality's Central Office at St. Louis, Missouri. Therefore, the Junior Sodality has an advisory committee which is composed of the officers of the sodality, the chairmen of the permanent committees for the year, and the moderator of the sodality. This plan is called the Central Council and the members of it meet prior to the regular meeting of the entire sodality. These committees serve as the directive force of the organization.

At the meeting on Tuesday evening the members of the sodality were asked to signify their preference for a committee. As a result of the survey the following Committee Chairmen were chosen for the year 1942-1943: Eucharistic Committee, Kathleen Kelly; Our Lady's Committee, Joan Scollan; Apostolic Committee, Jean Mitchell; Membership Committee, Louise Champ; Social Life, Betty Falsay and Publicity, Jean McMahon. Miss Betty Bradley presided at the meeting and there was an introductory ceremony for the new members. The Eucharistic Committee voted to have a representative at Mass each morning during October and the Sodality representing the Sodality is to pray for the members of the parish in the armed forces. We know that Our Lord made great promises to those who communicated on the First Friday of each month but how few recall the establishment of the devotion in its present form? How many know that it was to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque that Our Lord chose to reveal the devotion of the Sacred Heart? Next Saturday, Oct. 17, is the Feast of St. Margaret Mary. She was born in 1647 and as a little child loved prayer and solitude. Her father died when she was but eight years of age and she was sent to a Convent School. While there she suffered a form of paralysis and was ill for four years, but was miraculously cured when she promised to dedicate herself to Our Lady as a child. Margaret Mary suffered both mentally and physically. She was forced to live with relatives who treated her cruelly. When she grew older, she was torn between love of her mother who begged her to marry so they could escape the tyranny of the family and her desire to become a nun.

One day after receiving Holy Communion Our Lord appeared to her and after this visit she entered the convent. While she was praying in the convent chapel, Our Lord again appeared to her and said, "My Divine Heart is so inflamed with love for men and for thee in particular that being unable any longer to contain within itself the flames of its burning charity, it must needs spread them abroad by thy means." On the First Friday when she was again praying in the chapel, Our Lord appeared to her and told her of the ingratitude of the world and asked her to make some reparation for that ingratitude and said "In the first place thou shalt receive Me in Holy Communion as often as obedience will permit thee and Thou shalt, moreover, communicate on the First Friday of each month." Our Lord also asked St. Margaret Mary to spend the hour before midnight on Thursday in prayer and union with Him.

Thus, we have the First Friday Devotions in their present form. Thousands of people the world over, flock to the church on the First Friday of each month to pay homage to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and many make the Holy Hour on Thursday evenings in love and veneration to the Sacred Heart. That St. Margaret Mary did as Our Lord requested, even though it meant sacrifice and misunderstanding, can not be denied for the devotion of the First Fridays is universal. 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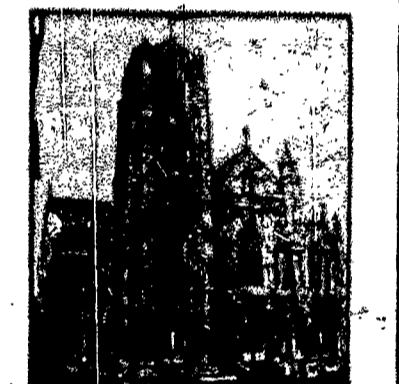
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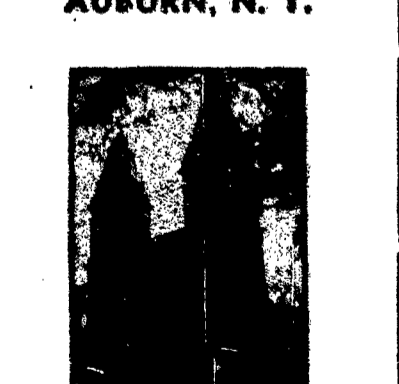
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
