CHAPLAINS ON RADIO TELL OF SERVICE TO TROOPS

NEW YORK — The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Francis W. Walsh, a Vicar Delegate of the Army and Navy Diocese and the Rev. Pacifico A. Ortiz, chaplain to President Manuel Quezon, of the Philippines, took part in a radio colloquy broadcast from coast-to-coast by the National Broadcasting Company.

Monsignor Walsh cited the importance of the chaplain in the nation's armed forces, saying that "the chaplain's job is to help the boys who are with him whenever he can, however he can," although "naturally, he must first take care of their spiritual needs—that is his mission in life."

Father Ortiz described his experiences on Corregidor, paying tribute to the heroism of American and Filipino troops on both the besieged island-fortress and Bataan.
