

Supreme Knight Calls For K. of C. Service

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alled mission of our service," declared Supreme Knight Matthews in his masterful review of the 60 years of movements of the Knights of Columbus.

"Encouragement in our society's destiny seems to be unfolding with the progress of time, the Supreme Knight who is a vice president of the United Service Organizations and chairman of the National Catholic Community Service, Catholic unit of the USO asserted.

Hommage to Founder

Paying sincere and fervent tribute to the memory of the late Rev. Michael McGivney, founder of the Knights of Columbus, the Supreme Knight reviewed what had been accomplished by the order since the beloved priest and a handful of Catholic laymen began the work of the order 60 years ago in New Haven.

"Father McGivney needs no material monument to perpetuate his greatness," said the Supreme Knight.

The Knights of Columbus care of the families of deceased members through its insurance feature was cited. The sum of \$65,000,000 has gone into 60,000 stricken houses in 60 years he pointed out.

Success to the unfortunate in times of calamities and floods has gone from the order to peoples of Japan and Puerto Rico and never yet has the Knights of Columbus questioned the color of a man's skin, nor his greed in the worship of God before extending a helpful hand in time of peril.

The record of the Knights of Columbus in the first World War, their cheer brought to the convalescent hospitals after the war and the work of rehabilitation, extension courses and other helps to servicemen was cited.

Boy Work Cited

"America today has nothing to guard more zealously than the boyhood of this land," the Supreme Knight declared as he recounted the expenditure of \$3,000,000 made by the K of C in establishing boy leadership courses at Notre Dame University and other Catholic institutions of learning and told of the development of the Columbian Scouts, junior organization of the order.

Two outstanding accomplishments he cited were the donation of \$2,000,000 in 1921 at direct request of Holy Father to establish the boy week within the shadow of the Vatican and the sum of \$6,000,000 unhesitatingly extended in 1930 to the unfortunate of Mexico and other lands.

In the field of education the Knights of Columbus, he reminded, have extended \$500,000 to the Catholic University of America, have established the Historical Commission, have carried on nationwide educational programs, and lecture courses and through the Fourth Degree have stimulated patriotism to a high degree.

Lauds State Chaplain

Opening his address the Supreme Knight paid tribute to His Excellency Bishop Kearney, New York State Chaplain, who, he said, is recognized as a friend of the order throughout the entire membership and in the Bishop of Rochester is found the example and inspiration to carry on in the proper development of the society.

Of State Deputy Hugh A. Doyle of New York, the international leader said, he is the "best state deputy in the Knights of Columbus."

His Excellency Bishop Kearney was presented by Norman A. O'Brien, chairman of the successful Communion Breakfast, and Grand Commander of Musa Caravan, Order of the Alhambra who presided as toastmaster.

The most wonderful and most beautiful exemplification of fraternity came to him, the Bishop said, in the outstanding privilege that was his of placing the Precious Body and Blood of Jesus Christ on the tongue of his brother Knights of Columbus.

Represents Hierarchy

The Bishop asked prayers for the Supreme Knight of whom he said never has so much been asked and stated that never has any Supreme Knight done so much. The present Supreme Knight has been commissioned by the Hierarchy, he said, to represent the Archbishops and Bishops in the responsible work of the National Catholic Community Service and to direct that work for the boys in the service.

"In our care of young people we have very definite moral standards that we demand," the Bishop

Rules Ban Food From Mailings To Men In Armed Forces Overseas

Regulations governing mail for members of the Armed Forces overseas are stressed in the following from Postmaster Donald A. Dwyer.

"The mailing of certain articles to members of the Armed Forces overseas is prohibited, among these being intoxicants, poisons, and like matter. Further, the Post Office Department now prohibits the mailing of food, not only because crumbs and other matter escaping from the parcels attract vermin, but for the additional reason that the armed forces are amply supplied with food. The prohibition of food includes candy.

"While the regulations allow that parcels weighing 11 pounds and measuring not over 18 inches
