Returned Chaplain Pays Tribute To Piety Of U. S. Troops In Australia

SAN ANTONIO - Tribute to the piety of non-Catholic as well as Catholic men in the armed forces of the United States in Australia was paid here by the Rev. Edward J. Burns, O.M.I., United States Army chaplain and former pastor of St. Anthony's Apostolic College, this city.

Father Burns, a captain, back from duty with American troops in Australia, addressed the facilities and students of St. Anthony's College and De Mazwood Scholasticate at the college concerning his experiences in Australia. His group was the first American contingent to set foot on Australian soil.

He told how he would go with the American fliers as they raced to their planes in jeeps when an alert sounded, saying he heard many confessions of men in jeeps while the cars were travelling at "breakneck speed." Many non-Catholic fliers, he said, seated in their planes ready to take off, asked Father Burns to bless them. "For we don't know what the future holds in store for us, Padre," they commented.

"I have never seen such religious fervor as was shown by the men in my outfit," Father Burns went on. "They attended Mass regularly, received the Sacrament of Penance and approached the Holy Table very, very often. Edifying devotions were attended regularly, so much so that our chapel was wholly inadequate to accommodate all."
