

Catholics Called To Cooperate In Rochester First-Aid Week

A proclamation issued Tuesday by Samuel H. Dickor, Mayor of the city of Rochester, calls for Rochester First Aid Week, a city-wide campaign to enlist a person in every home in Rochester and Monroe County trained in First Aid technique. The necessity for this campaign was stressed by George H. Hawks, Chairman of the Rochester Chapter of the American Red Cross, in a statement issued by him yesterday.

"It cannot be emphasized too strongly," said Mr. Hawks, "that

hour accident has taken a tremendous toll of production hours necessary and vital to the war effort of this country. Every man injured and requiring a long time out from his job for recovery, is equal to a serious sabotage of production. Every accident, causing infection, or delayed convalescence, puts a dent in manpower available. It behooves each one of us in our homes, and in our work to know as much about First Aid as we possibly can, in order that when unavoidable accidents do occur, we can treat them immediately and

effectively," said Mr. Hawks.

It is not necessary that a bombing or a disaster should occur to make us conscious of the necessity for First Aid. With doctors and nurses leaving to take their places beside the members of the armed forces, each one of us here at home must form a trained army able to protect ourselves when injury strikes.

The American Red Cross, foreseeing this, has provided a training ground in First Aid technique and the week of Nov. 1 to Nov. 8 has been set aside to make the public conscious of the immediate and drastic need for training everyone in this vital service.

First Aid courses are open now and new courses will be open to accommodate everyone. It is earnestly requested by city and county officials that "you, the public register now for First Aid training. You can register by filling out the coupon appearing on page ten or by calling Main 6100, your Red Cross Chapter."

Plans are being made to hold a class in First Aid to be sponsored by Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus in Columbus Civic Center. Announcement of the plans will be made at the Council meeting, Nov. 8.

Paul S. Kreag, 43, was born in Rochester, the oldest of a family of five children. He attended No. 15 school, where he was standard bearer, East High School, where he played on the baseball track and soccer teams, University of Rochester, from which he graduated in 1920 with an A.B. Degree, and Syracuse University Law College from which he graduated in 1925 with I. B. Degree. He also spent one year at Georgetown University. He was an honor student at Syracuse where he was elected to the Justitia Honorary Law Society and Phi Kappa Phi.

Kreag was admitted to the New York State Bar in 1925 and now maintains a law office in the Powers Bldg.

Kreag, a World War I veteran was commander of Milton Lewis Post American Legion in 1937, of which post he has been chairman of the Americanism Committee for the past two years.

Kreag is a member of the Rochester Bar Association and chairman of its Judiciary Committee.

Kreag worked his way through college by supervising boys clubs in grammar schools.

Conducting these boys' activities for four years was a splendid experience in dealing with children.

Kreag assisted in the supervision of the Big Brother's Club which was organized and financed by his uncle, the late J. Adam Kreag, in 1919. For many years it accomplished much good by keeping the young men of the neighborhood off the streets by interesting them in athletics and other beneficial activities. In 1920 the baseball team composed of its members won the championship of the city. It was coached by his brother, Karl A. Kreag, now a physician in Brooklyn.

He is married and resides at 98 Irvington Road, Rochester. Kreag is a member of St. Anne's Parish where he is an active member of the Holy Name Society.

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
