Nun from Here Is Pioneer Among Missioners To West

Four Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart, including one from Rochester, departed from their Motherhouse in Towson, Md., Oct. 20 to begin their long journey away across the Continent to the little mining town of Bisbee, Ariz., where they will open a new Mission.

The pioneer missioners are Sister M. Joan, formerly of Holy Redeemer Parish, this city; Sister M. Barbara of Providence, R. L.; Sister M. Conception of Laredo, Puerto Rico, and Sister M. Plus of Danbury, Conn.

The call from out the parched, wind-swept canyons of Arizona, was sounded last June, it is reported from the Motherhouse. The invitation that drew the Sisters came from His Excellency, the Most Rev. Daniel J. Cereke, D.D., Bishop of Tucson. His Excellency wrote:

"Dear Mother: 'Matins and Lauds over for tomorrow here goes a proposition to you. The Charity of Christ urges me. I have prayed over it, and your letter with the two vocational booklets led me to this appeal. About 135 miles from Tucson is the little city of Bisbee—a mining center. It has two parishes: St. Patrick's with a parochial school, and the parish of the Sacred Heart, a Mexican parish with a Mexican padre.

Here is a work that involves about 1,000 Catholic children in the public schools. I am making an appeal to you kindly to take over this center. I can guarantee that you will never find a better field for the exercise of zeal on the part of your noble Sisters than here. While I have in mind primarily catechetical instruction of the chil-

dren, the Sisters will find a great field for parish visiting.

"I do not expect the impossible. I would like you to send somebody out to look over the ground. I do so hope and pray that you will see your way to take over this mission of Bisbee. Its acceptance, I know, will bring many blessings upon us and your order. After reading Archbishop Curley's letter in 'My New Curates,' I said 'That's the kind of an order we need for Bisbee.' There is need of them in other places, too, if you could spare the Sisters.

"Do not be alarmed! was the battle cry of St. Francis Xavier. Give me Souls, O Lord! I have been in China, the Philippines, all over the world, and I can assure you that, if you want souls to save, come to Bisbee, Arizona."

Shortly after receiving this letter, two Sisters went West—to see His Excellency's expression. To look over the ground. They looked for and found the treasure that had drawn them almost all the way across the continent—thousands of spiritually-in-need souls, and it was this that formed the definite decision to open a new mission as a center for their missionary activities, in the little mining town of Bisbee.

Many kind friends and benefactors have taken a keen interest in this new Mission the Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart are opening, and have made possible by their splendid offerings the realization of many needs, which otherwise, could never have been supplied. The Sisters now ask all to accompany and back the work of these pioneer missioners by an occasional prayer.

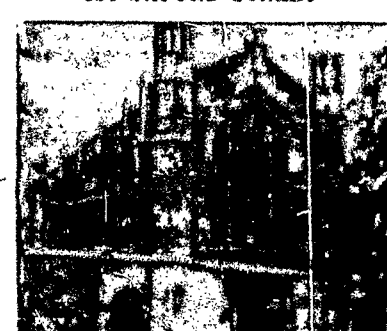

Knights of St. John Turn Out At Corporate Communion

"You are the knights of Jesus Christ and that knighthood finds its first service in a most powerful weapon, the weapon of prayer."

This message was given by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney to 400 members of Rochester Regiment, Knights of St. John, gathered at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church, Sunday morning, for the regiment's second annual Corporate Communion.

The Mass was celebrated by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Jacob R. Hauber. The Rev. Francis R. Hoefen, pastor, welcomed the Knights, and with the Rev. Joseph C. Merkel, assisted the Bishop at the Communion. The Communion intention was for members in the armed services and restoration of a just peace.

As the Holy Mass was on the Feast of Christ the King, the Bishop declared in his sermon that Knights of St. John are servants par excellence of the King "whom we honor today."

The Communion and Mass, the Bishop said is "an outstanding contribution you can make to the

restoration of the Kingship of Christ in the world today."

Explaining that the sword is a symbol of the power of prayer and that the "sword of the spirit" is an intercommunication between the knights and God, the Bishop stated that their spiritual physique is the foundation of all their fighting. Equipped with their "sword of the spirit," the knights were urged to go forth into the field of Catholic Action with a definite part to play in the world ruled by Christ the King.

Headed by Col. Frederick J. Wegman, the knights in uniform marched from Red Wing Stadium to the church, followed by the non-uniformed members. The uniformed knights occupied the two center aisles and the non-uniformed the side aisles. Following the services the knights again marched to the stadium where they were dismissed following the dismissal of the colors ceremony.
