Parallel To U. S.

The war today is the first real World War because it has made us think in terms of the whole world, he said. A United Nations of the world should not be a power bloc, but it should be one which is parallel to the United States with one government and one leader.

With this war, he pointed out, has come the realization that all interior barriers have been wiped out; that there is no limit to expansion of people over the face of the world. This is a geo-political fact; a political unity must be achieved.

The basic issue is whether this unity is to be gained by conquest or by a confederation. Problematically, a confederation is the answer. Conquest may only be suggested as a solution when it is followed by justice. This is not a granted outcome, however, for conquest leads to other wars.

As in the American revolution when each individual was asked to think of himself first as an American and then as a member of a certain state, in the same way we are now to think of ourselves as citizens of the world and then as an American, he said.

"Once the war is over," Professor Adler concluded, "America will forget Geo-politics and try to follow an isolationist policy. But we cannot pursue this policy for long, for we are our brother's keeper. We cannot remain aloof from the other nations. The world is too small for people who want war and those who advocate peace to exist side by side. Democracy cannot exist much longer in the United States unless it is kept alive by growing and spreading over all nations."

Me: "I guess so."

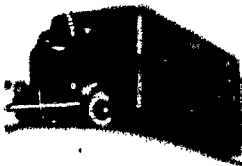
He: "Well bacon and eggs three times a day ain't so bad."
