paper picture caught his eye.

It was the photograph of the
Rev. Dr. John A. Reddington, fac-

McAniff of the Religious Corre-
spondence Course staff at St. Ber-
nard's which appeared in the
CATHOLIC COURIER, Oct. 20,
1941, and later was sent out widely
by a news photo service.

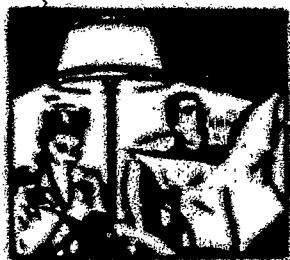


