DEDICATES SERVICE ROLL

CORNING — The Rev. John A. Smith, pastor, delivered the sermon in dedication of the Honor Roll, containing 161 names of members of St. Mary's Parish who are in the armed forces of the United States at the 9:30 a. m. Mass Sunday. The Roll was placed upon St. Joseph's altar, which was beautifully decorated for the occasion, and other names will be added to it from time to time.

Friends and relatives of the men in the service looked to the Communion rail and took part in the special prayers which were said for the fighting forces at the end of the Mass.

Mentioning the fact that already one on the Honor Roll had paid the supreme sacrifice and one had been reported missing for months, Father Smith said:

"We are proud of our parish, but we are especially proud of our Honor Roll. These 161 men have gone out to fight for their love of God, love of country and love of home. They have also gone out to fight for their right of faith for the Kingdom of God upon earth.

"We at home work hard, study hard and play hard but we do not pray hard enough. We must open up a second front of prayer."

In conclusion the pastor said "May God and your country always call you best."

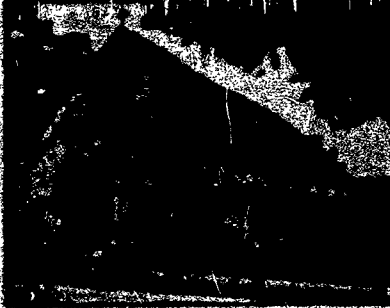
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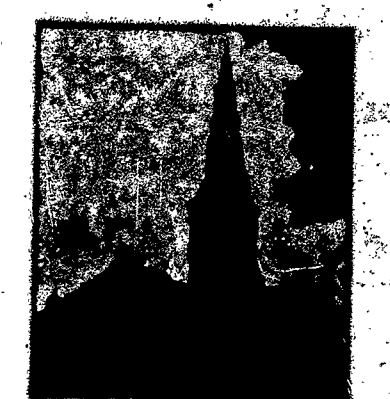
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MEN'S MISSION OPENS

HORNELL — Mission services for the women of St. Ann's parish closed last Sunday, October 25, at 2:30 o'clock with solemn and impressive ceremonies. The Mission was conducted by the Very Rev. H. John Healey, O. P., P. G., and the Rev. J. D. Kearney, O. P., of the Dominican Order.

Services during the week consisted of the Mission Masses at 8 and 8 o'clock each morning, and the evening devotions at 7:45 o'clock. Each service was opened with the recitation of the Rosary. During the week the women offered candles before the Altar for special intentions and for the welfare of the parishioners serving in the country's armed forces.

At the conclusion of the Mission, each woman of the parish pledged herself to one of the two church societies honoring the Blessed Virgin Mary. The two organizations are the Rosary and Altar Society and the Young Ladies Sodality.

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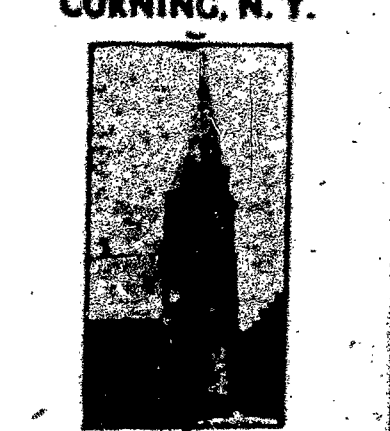
