Pope and Scientists

Vatican City. Receiving the members of the Congress of the Italian Society for the Progress of Science His Holiness Pope Pius XII expressed the sincere hope that with the conclusion of war scientists might be able once more to dedicate their efforts to those things which bring about the extension of goodwill among men and to effect a new world order based upon justice.

"The church," the Holy Father said, "is the friend of all truth. It is not and cannot be the enemy of the true progress of science."

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
