## JEHOVAH WITNESS LEADER DEPORTED FROM ENGLAND

LONDON. Leader of Jehovah's Witnesses in Britain, A. D. Schroeder, is on his way home to the United States after the failure of his plea that being a fully-ordained Christian minister he should be allowed to work here. The Home Secretary rejected his appeal.

Earlier he had appealed to the Ministry of Labor and the National Service Committee, and he was ordered to report for farm work in Kent. He did not comply with this order and his deportation followed.
