AUBURN. Sister M. Huberta, first president of Mercy Hospital has been elected a member of the American College of Hospital Administrators. She was received into the college by Dr. Lactus R. Wilson, president and Joseph G. McHenry, president-elect, at a formal reception last week in the ballroom of the Jefferson Hotel, St. Louis, Mo.

This is viewed as a tribute to the Sisterhood of the Third Franciscan Order of Syracuse of which Sister Huberta is a member. The Mother House is at St. Anthony's Concept in Court St. Syracuse.

The American College of Hospital Administrators has members from every state of the Union, Hawaii and London, England and seeks to promote maintenance of high hospital standards in care and administration. At Sister M. Huberta's induction the College also conferred an honorary degree upon Dr. Winford Henry Smith, director of John Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore.

## 93-YEAR-OLD NUN ASTOUNDS CITY WITH VIGOR AND ACTIVITIES

TOLEDO, Ohio. Mother St. Theresa, OSU, oldest member of the Ursuline Community here who is celebrating this month the seventy-fifth anniversary of her entrance into the order will mark her ninety-fourth birthday Oct. 29.

Despite her years, Mother St. Theresa's activities have long impressed Toledo. They include the making of the Way of the Cross about ten times a day, attendance at chapel meditations at six each morning, attendance at chapel prayers each night, knitting for the Red Cross or clipping stamps for the missions and occasional apple or berry gathering in season.

Mother St. Theresa who has lived under 21 Presidents since the time of James K. Polk, was born in Newport, O., in 1845. She has known every Bishop of the Cleveland and Toledo Diocese ever had.

There were only 20 nuns in the Ursuline community here when she entered. Since then, hundreds have passed under her influence. She taught at St. Joseph's, St. Louis', St. Mary's, St. Francis de Sales' schools, Ursuline Convent, St. Ursula Academy and Nazareth Hall.

## VATICAN'S RESIDENT ENVOYS NOW NUMBER 162 PERSONS

VATICAN CITY. Since the representatives of South American countries have taken up residence in Vatican City—having moved from Rome when their countries broke off relations with Italy—the diplomatic colony here now numbers 162 persons, including 17 families.

The latest to take up residence in Vatican City are the Ambassadors and other envoys to the Holy See from Brazil, Bolivia, Colombia, Cuba and Uruguay. The Minister of Venezuela is expected soon to take up residence here.

It is considered likely here that when he returns soon from his annual leave, the Ambassador from France to the Holy See will transfer his residence from Vatican City to Rome, leaving the Counselor of the French Embassy in residence here.

## Foresees 'Rationing' Of Religious Aid

NORFOLK, Va. Rationing of religious ministrations among civilians was mentioned as a possibility by the Most Rev. Joseph P. Hurley, Bishop of St. Augustine, in an address Saturday before 34 graduates of the Chaplains School at the Norfolk Naval Operating Base.

"The time has come when we should say to our civilians: We cannot continue religion as usual," the Bishop said, reminding that the war has brought about the greatest migration in history, and the migrants are the young men who "most need our ministrations."

"We must follow them into camps and bases, and into the combat areas, so that no one of our boys will face the moral and physical dangers of war without the support and solace of his holy religion, without having a priest at his side," Bishop Hurley said.

"If, in order, to do that, a curtailment of civilian ministrations is necessary," he added, "then I say, 'Ration the service of religion on the home front' so that our boys may have a sufficiency, not an abundance, of religious services in the training areas and in the theaters of war."
