ST. MONICA'S PARISH

**LEADS WITH BLOOD BANK SET
NOV. 10, 11 IN PARISH HALL**

The Mobile Unit of the Blood Bank will be at St. Monica's Parish Hall on Tuesday and Wednesday, Nov. 10 and 11, from 2 o'clock in the afternoon to 7:30 in the evening.

The Boy Scouts of St. Monica's, numbering twenty-four, are canvassing the entire parish for donors. Anyone between the ages of 18 and 60 may participate.

When the Scouts contact the parishioners, they will have application cards which are to be filled out immediately. These cards will be turned in to the Rosary Society at the regular meeting on Friday evening. Members of the Rosary, under the direction of Mrs. I. Wagner, will, in turn, make out appointment cards, giving the exact time that the individual should appear at the blood bank, and these cards will be put in the mail on Sunday to reach the people on Monday.

St. Monica's is the first Church in the city to take part in this splendid project. One hundred fifty donors are needed for each day, and it is expected that many more than this number will apply.

The Rosary Society of St. Mon-

ica is directly responsible for this project. They have turned all the preliminary work over to the Boy Scouts, who are to be highly commended for the way in which they are carrying out their difficult assignment.

If, after some reconsideration, anyone should want to donate his blood to this cause, he should call either the Rectory, Genesee 130, or Mrs. Wagner, Genesee 1747-M.
