

K. C. Fourth Degree To Raise Fund For Retreat House Pews

The need for pews in the chapel of the Lady of the Lake Retreat House, Seneca Lake, Geneva, will be met by a subscription campaign announced this week by members of Rochester Fourth Degree Assembly, Knights of Columbus.

The project which is to be the main objective of the Rochester Assembly this year was brought to the Assembly in a letter from His Excellency Bishop Kearney, state chaplain of the order, expressing approval with the knights for taking up the work.

Heading the proposed subscription campaign before the Assembly was Master Cyril J. Staff of the Fifth District Fourth Degree, K. of C. who had attended the Knights of Columbus retreat at the Diocesan Retreat House in September and had noted the lack of pews in the chapel.

The Assembly presided over by Faithful Navigator Joseph A. Murphy voted wholeheartedly to undertake the project. Committees will be named and members of the Fourth Degree will be solicited.

It is planned to make the presentation of the fund for the pews in the presence of Bishop Kearney to the Rev. John P. Murphy, C.S.S.R., director of the Retreat House at the Fourth Degree Christmas Party in December.

Schu, National Aide Of Knights, Mourned

Word of the death of Brigadier General Leo G. Schu, Supreme Secretary of the Knights of St. John in Evansville, Ind., his home, Monday, Nov. 9, has brought sorrow to the many members of Rochester Regiment, Knights of St. John and Ladies' Auxiliary, who knew the dynamic executive of the order.

Supreme President Frank H. Bief of Rochester left on Tuesday for the funeral which will be attended by the Supreme Board of the order.

Supreme Secretary Schu, who was last in Rochester to pay a stop-over call in May on the late Supreme President, Mrs. Teresa Ganster, prior to his death, is well remembered from his visit here to attend the International Convention of the order in 1940.

He had held the office of Supreme Secretary since 1922 and was in Rochester in 1921 for the previous International Convention. It was being recalled here this week by the knights that in addition to being a capable executive, he had the happy faculty of calling members by their first names after once meeting them.

Rochester Chapter No. 3, Chevaliers, the fourth degree unit of the Knights of St. John, heard word of Supreme Secretary Schu's death at the dinner Monday night. Condolences and a Requiem High Mass card were sent to the bereaved family in Evansville by the Fourth Degree.

Joseph P. MacSweeney has been named a Member-at-Large of the State Committee on Tuberculosis and Public Health of the State Charities Aid Association.

Judge Peter Cantline of Newburg, State Committee Chairman, in announcing the choice of Mr. MacSweeney, stated that membership on the Committee included 64 Members-at-Large, chosen for their special prominence in public health, social welfare, education, or other civic affairs. Sixty-one members are elected by affiliated County and City Associations.

The choice of Mr. MacSweeney, who is President of the Tuberculosis and Health Association of Rochester and Monroe County and a charter member of that organization, is an acknowledgement of the value of the service being rendered in the campaign against tuberculosis during the past quarter century by "devoted laymen."
