


Air Mail Rate For Overseas Cited By P. O.

A large volume of air mail prepaid at the rate of 6 cents an ounce instead of 8 cents a half ounce, the proper rate, is being received at post offices in the continental United States addressed to the personnel of the Armed Forces overseas. The rating and collection of postage due on this mail places an unnecessary burden on the post office service and considerably delays the receipt of the mail by the addressee.

The rate of postage on air mail sent to and by members of the Armed Forces outside the continental United States is 6 cents for each half ounce. Every effort should be made by the mailing public to have such mail fully prepaid. The only exception to the foregoing applies to mail by airplane addressed to a member of the Armed Forces in care of the Postmaster at Seattle, Wash., and this air mail should be prepaid at the rate of 6 cents an ounce.

Citizenship Education Classes Show High Increase

"The monthly attendance and registration of aliens at W. P. A. Citizenship Education and English Classes has shattered all records and expectations" according to William E. McCarthy, W. P. A. Area Director of Service Projects.

On Sept. 14, a county-wide "Naturalization Aide" and "Citizenship Education" program was launched under the sponsorship of United States Department of Justice, Immigration and Naturalization Service, Work Projects Administration, New York State Department of Education, and Rochester Board of Education. The purpose of the "Aide Meetings" was to assist local aliens in making out naturalization application papers, and the Citizenship and English classes, to prepare them for naturalization examination.

The Columbus Day pronouncement of U. S. Attorney General Francis Biddle, that our 600,000 Italian aliens were absolved of the restrictions placed upon "alien enemies" spurred Italian and other aliens in an all-out effort toward full citizenship.

During the first ten months of this year the average monthly attendance at W. P. A. Citizenship and English Classes averaged approximately 1,400. By Nov. 1, as a consequence of the interest shown in them by the four departments of National, State and local Governments the monthly class attendance had surged to a "believe-it-or-not" all-time high of 6,623. Seven hundred, forty-two free afternoon and evening W. P. A. Citizenship and English classes are located in 26 conveniently located Church Schools, Civic and Fraternal Halls and Public Schools—throughout the city and county.

"Nineteen different nationalities are represented by this growing adult student body," stated Mrs. Katherine V. Malone, W. P. A., Supervisor of Adult Education. "Those of Italian extraction predominate of course, followed by Polish, Canadian, German, Austrian and English. About one-third of our student body are illiterate, and two-thirds are illiterate and semi-illiterate," she stated.

"Some idea of the far-reaching beneficial effects of these Government sponsored, free Education Classes upon the alien homes, may be gleaned from a survey recently conducted among our alien parent-students: 465 students are parents of a total of 1,718 sons and daughters many of whom are serving in our armed forces. Twenty-nine parent-students report 162 children, 37 report 210 children, 25 parents, 115 children and 30 students in another center report 121 sons and daughters," Mrs. Malone reported.

500 Navy Recruits Get Public Blessing

BOSTON — In the first public ceremony in Boston involving this war's naval recruits, more than 500 received a blessing in Post Office Square while thousands looked on in approval. The blessing was bestowed upon them by Father Joseph C. Carty, Navy chaplain formerly connected with St. John's Church, Attleboro, Mass., who said: "May God speed the completion of the righteous task that lies before you."


