Open Home Nursing Courses

Instruction in Home Nursing as a war measure is being expanded by the Rochester Chapter of the American Red Cross, according to George Hawks, Chairman of the Rochester Chapter today. Classes for women, girls, men and boys in Red Cross Home Nursing are to be conducted by a graduate nurse authorized as an instructor by the National Red Cross, Mr. Hawks said. "Because in many communities large numbers of doctors and nurses are leaving for service with the armed forces, the home-maker needs to learn to be more resourceful," Mr. Hawks pointed out. "She needs to be able to better care for

her own family while nursing and medical facilities are being drawn from civilian life. She can gain that resourcefulness through training in a Red Cross Home Nursing course. "In the course, which is twenty-four to thirty hours long, the homemaker is taught self-reliance in caring for sick members of her family particularly. She learns how to prevent illnesses through proper diet, exercise and rest, how to keep a healthy home environment, how to care for the baby and growing children, and how to deal with community health problems, such as the prevention of the spread of communicable diseases," Mr. Hawks continues.

Classes will be open to everyone, Mr. Hawks emphasized, and will be arranged to suit the convenience of those registering. Curran Lauds Shrine Church Of The Sea

NEW YORK. — The seamen's welfare work of the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John J. O'Donnell at the Shrine Church of the sea, here, was praised by Joseph Curran, president of the National Maritime Union, CIO, in an address to the Propeller Club and American Merchant Marine Conference. Curran said that with the exception of the Shrine Church and the United Seamen's Service, "I've seen very little beneficial work
