Cites Verein's Long Study Of Day Nursery Problem

Increasing interest in the work of the Central Verein was revealed by delegates reporting on their affiliated societies to the Rochester Branch, Catholic Central Verein of America at the meeting held Sunday afternoon, Nov. 15, in St. Joseph's Hall.

Guests of the Men's Branch were members of the Rochester Branch, National Catholic Women's Union, Stephen V. Kuchman, chairman of the committee on arrangements, announced that the patronal feast of the Central Verein, would be celebrated with a High Mass at St. Joseph's church on Dec. 6 at 10 A. M.

A discussion of the request of National President William H. Eifen, for purchase of War Bonds by members, disclosed that practically every delegate and member was purchasing bonds and that affiliated societies were buying many thousands of dollars' worth of War bonds.

The Branches sent a telegram of congratulations to F. P. Kenkel, Director of the Central Bureau, on the occasion of his 50th wedding anniversary.

The main topic of discussion was the report of the Central Bureau for the year 1941-1942. Members expressed amazement at the multiplicity of activities carried on by the Bureau, particularly in view of its limited income. Credit was given to the splendid personnel of the Bureau, and to the fact that it was an institution with "both feet on the ground."

Former County Judge Philip H. Donnelly, a member of the National Committee on Social Action, gave an illuminating report of the work of the Bureau. Among other things he mentioned the establishment many years ago of St. Elizabeth's Day Nursery as a laboratory study of the practical working of a day nursery. Judge Donnelly said that the information acquired through this study puts the Bureau in a fine position to speak with authority on the problem of care of the children of working women, a problem which is today very real and will probably continue to need much attention in the post-war period.

Among those who participated in the discussion of the report were Joseph T. Otto, Edward Heberle, Martin Spindler, William Wittman, Harry deCocq, Joseph H. Cervala, August M. Maier, Laura K. Schilling, Madge Spiegel and Rev. Stephen Aulbach, C.S.B.R.

Father Aulbach also spoke of the timeliness of the resolution of the National Convention on Spiritual Retreats for Men in the Armed Forces.

William J. Fuehrer, president of the Men's Branch, presided.

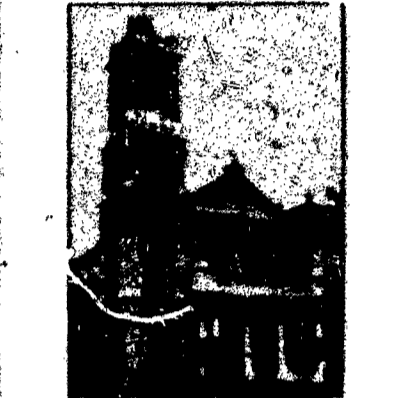

REPORTS PETAN, CARDINALS DISCUSS CHURCH-STATE

ZURICH, Switzerland. — (NC) — Commenting on the report of recent conversations at Vichy between Marshal Petain, French Chief of State, and Their Eminences Emmanuel Cardinal Suhard, Archbishop of Paris, and Pierre Cardinal Gerlier, Archbishop of Lyon, the Basler Nachrichten Vichy states that there is every reason to assume that the main subject under discussion was the relations between the Church and the new French State.

The German agency Europa Press also opines that a Concordat is imminent and states that the "discussions are said to have led to a preliminary pact."
