WAAC's Value Told To PTA By Lt. Geherin Of Auburn

ITHACA—Lieutenant Jean Geherin, WAACS, Fort Des Moines, Iowa, a graduate of Trinity College and former teacher in Nazareth College, Rochester, spoke before the P. T. A. Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 18. She was presented by Mrs. John F. Geherin, president of the P. T. A.

Miss Geherin, whose home is in Auburn, quoted a writer in the CATHOLIC COURIER to emphasize her point. "The WAACs are organized under the American Eagle and not under a Lark." On the whole she said the press had been more concerned with the color of their uniforms and length of the uniform skirts than with the actual work that they were being trained to perform.

The Corps is trained in 13 different kinds of jobs, she explained, all destined to relieve some soldier from routine duty and put him in the combat zone. It takes a man to keep one man on the firing line.

Outlines WAAC's Day

When the Corps was organized, 1,500 officer candidates were accepted from throughout the United States for an intensive eight week course. Lieut. Geherin outlined the day of an officer recruit as follows:

5:45 A. M. First Call, and "If you're a little slow, you had better start at 5:30."

6:00 A. M. Reveille Formation followed by breakfast.

Bed-making or Quarters Police keeps the candidate busy until 8:55 A. M. when inspection by Army

Officers takes place. Every inch and every eye closely observed and if a speck of dirt is present it is sure to be found, on rigid and the inspections.

At 8:45 A. M.—Close Order Drill. Lieutenant Geherin answered the question why should women recruits drill by saying that there were three good reasons for it, namely—they are taught to march instantly in order, without questions or hesitation; they move in order and military fashion and thus escape enemy detection; the value of drilling as a lift to the morale of both partners and observers.

From 8 A. M. to 12 M.—Classes in 12 different subjects, including military customs and courtesies, defense against chemical attack, etc.

Mail Call Important

After dinner recruits have an hour of physical training. Mail Call, the most important moment in the day of those in service, men or women, comes later in the afternoon, followed by supper at 6:15 P. M.

An officer then asks if recruits would like an hour of drill, supposedly voluntary, but amounting to an order. Following this, recruits are required to take various examinations given by numer-

ous instructors. Appointments for special attention, and so on, "leave what the time used as a guide" she stated.

Lights Out at 9:30 P. M. Recruits MUST be in bed.

Auditory training, consisting of the standard phrases and of words in the German language, must be practiced 15-20 and other duties which of necessity could not be included in the list.

Candidates are trained for four weeks after which they may apply for entrance into American Schools, including Community College, Motor Transport, Business College, etc.

Lady Army Cooking

Lieutenant Geherin had high praise for the Army Cooks, saying that the food was not only well prepared and pleasing to the palate, she also commented upon the general spirit throughout the Corps saying there were no petty jealousies or bickerings.

Concluding her remarks, Lieutenant Geherin said the war was not won and every man and woman could replace would be the the masculine signature at the front.
