Overpowering a strong St. Joe's eleven last Sunday at the Old University Field, Aquinas closed another successful grid season by gaining a 27-6 win in the last game on its 1942 schedule.

The invaders threatened to score in the first period after driving to the Irish 14, but here their attack stalled and Aquinas took over the ball, kicking it to their own 41. Then St. Joe's fullback tossed a long pass to his end who scampered over with little opposition.

In the second period, however, Aquinas started an air attack with Billy Reynolds flipping a 40-yard pass to Costigan in the end zone. The conversion failed and the game was tied up at 6-6. Still using the airways, Billy accounted for another six-pointer when he threw a touchdown pass to Ray Pierce in the last three seconds of the first half. Graham's try for the extra point was successful, and Aquinas led 13-6.

The Irish obtained their next tally in the third quarter when Ray Pierce passed from the St. Joe 36 to Reynolds who eluded three of his foes and romped 20 yards to the goal line. Slayton then kicked the conversion to up the score another point. Leading by the comfortable margin of three touchdowns, the Maroon and White permitted its reserves to enter the battle. These lads followed the example of the first team and successfully took to the air. They managed to make a touchdown on a pass from Diehl to De Bolla, just a few minutes before the game ended.

Although he will lose several good players through graduation, Johnny Sullivan is looking forward to a good season next Fall. If the Irish do as well then as they have done this year winning five games and losing two, they will certainly turn in a fine performance.
