USE OF WORD "UNIAE"

Sometimes we see the word "Unia" used in referring to members of the Eastern Rites who are under the Holy See. This is a term which Oriental Catholics dislike. It should not be used. It was created by the separated Russian "Orthodox" with the intention of casting a reflection upon those who held fast to their Catholic heritage.

Catholics of whatever Rite, are Catholics. There is no disparity in the mind of the Church between those of the Latin and the Oriental Rites. If they are in union with Rome, all are Catholics. When we desire to distinguish between them we can use adjectives, Roman Catholic, Greek Catholic, Armenian Catholic, etc.

Compared with Latin Catholics, Catholics of the Eastern Rites are few in numbers—a little over eight millions. But their liturgies are very ancient, very beautiful and they rightly love their own ways. Again, there are a large number—about 160 million—who use the same Oriental Liturgies, but who have been separated from the Catholic Church for many centuries.

CONDITION

There is an old saying:
Money lost, little lost,

Today, there is every incentive to make money by saving it, and saving it, to buy war bonds, to invest in victory. There is every incentive to all of us to keep healthy, to get in condition and stay there.

Being in condition is no longer for football players alone, not for the lad who wants to join the marines. It's for everybody an absolute rule of faith to follow.

A youngster who gives up cigarettes, for instance, who swears off drink, who cuts out late hours and gets regular sleep, who has heart, courage and a purpose beyond himself.
