I'm only one mother among millions who are giving up what to dearest to them. My son has just had an auction and is selling his farm and taking his exame for the Army Corps Aviation Cadets. To crown all he suddenly got married to a lovely girl of French-Canadi-an stock, a good Catholic farm-raised, and they are full of plans for the farm they are going to have when he comes home from the war

I will go back a bit He always oved the country. We used to spend summers on a small New fiampshire farm and up to ten years old, he knew uttle in the way of actual city life. When he was about sixteen, he decided that he wanted to train the voice that we all loved and be a professional singer. He worked away at the Institute of Musical Art in New York, yet fearing more and more that he had missed his vocation He hated the city and the kind of unreality that pervades the lives of the "small-fry" of professional musicians and he was convinced that he would never be anything but small-fry bunself
