

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

Vincentian Community were made in Germantown on May 26, 1918 Ordained in 1932

He was ordained in Philadelphia by His Eminence Cardinal Dougherty, June 10, 1922. His doctorate in Canon Law was received in 1924.

From 1924 to 1930 he taught patrology, canon law and fundamental theology in the seminary at Brooklyn and philosophy in the college and graduate school. For a time he was Assistant Seminary Director.

In 1930 he was transferred to Niagara University as professor of Education.

Doctor Munday was born in Philadelphia, Dec. 17, 1907. Early education was received at St. Vincent's Parochial School, Germantown, Philadelphia and academic and collegiate courses at St. Joseph's College, Princeton. His Bachelor of Arts degree was conferred in June, 1929.

Entered in 1931

Entering the Novitiate of the Congregation of the Mission at St. Vincent's Seminary, Germantown, he took vows there on June 12, 1931.

He was ordained in Philadelphia on May 26, 1934, by the Most Rev. Gerald P. O'Hara, Auxiliary Bishop.

Occupying the office of Prefect and teaching at Niagara University, Niagara Falls, during 1934 and 1935, he took post-graduate work and received the degree Master of Arts, June, 1933.

Father Munday pursued post graduate work in philosophy at the Institute of Medieval Studies, St. Michael's College, University of Toronto, 1933 to 1936. While in Toronto he taught philosophy at St. Michael's College, St. Joseph's College and Loretto College. His degree of Doctor of Philosophy was awarded in June, 1938.

Rosuning teaching at Niagara University in 1938, he became professor of religion and philosophy at the Rochester Division, College of Business Administration and professor of philosophy in the Graduate School at Niagara Falls.

Since 1941 he has been teaching psychology to the affiliated students of nursing at Providence Retreat in Buffalo.
