Graney who retired from his duties as chief clerk and cashier was presented with a gift by Agent E. M. Stewart on behalf of the Auburn Staff.

Jeremiah Graney was born in Aurelius and is a well known member of the family of Graney's connected with the railroad. The late John Graney, father of Jerry was section boss for the New York Central for 60 years. Michael Graney brother, worked for the New York Central for 32 years being the local agent for many years. He retired ten years ago. Patrick, another brother, was yardmaster for the Central and lost his life in the service of the company. John Graney was supervisor of track of the old Auburn and Ithaca Railroad and he was fatally injured several years ago, while on duty. Edward Graney, also a brother lives in Washington and retired five years ago after years of service with the Interstate Commerce Commission. Miss Margaret Graney a sister has been a stenographer in the local offices of the Central for the past twenty-two years. Two nephews, John S. Graney of this city and Paul Graney of Utica were also former employees of the New York Central.

Jerry Graney entered the service of the railroad at the age 13. He was first employed as night operator in the upper offices of the old railroad station in State Street. He held the position of night operator from 1885 to 1897. From 1897 to 1899 he was day operator and in 1899 he became chief clerk and cashier.

Mr. Graney is a leading member of Holy Family Parish and was president of the Holy Name Society for several years. Mrs. Graney also is an active worker in parish activities. The Graney's have two sons and one daughter. John F. Graney is collector of Internal Revenue for the Auburn section and Harold is a clerk in the local offices of the New York Central. PROTEST PROSECUTION

AUBURN—The Polish people of Auburn held a rally commemorating the battle of Grunwald on Sunday afternoon at the Polish Home under the supervision of the Polish Relief Fund officers. A solemn protest was made against the tyranny of the Germans inflicted on the people of Poland.

Representatives of the various Polish organizations as well as the members of the Polish Relief Fund attended Mass at St. Hyacinth's on Sunday morning. The Mass was offered for the intention of all those who have died fighting for the freedom of Poland.

A program was presented at the Polish Home in the afternoon. It included choir singing and recita-

Mrs. Mary Kerpanty of Pittsburgh, vice president of the Polish Falcons of America, was the principal speaker. She spoke of the cruelty and sufferings imposed on the Polish people under German domination at the present time. A set of resolutions were drawn up and sent to the president of the United States appealing to him to intercede on behalf of the Poles.

In the battle of Grunwald, fought in 1410, the Poles were victorious. The battle was over in four hours; 50,000 of the enemy lay dead on the battlefield, 40,000 prisoners were taken and the remnants of the German Army fled, abandoning all supply and baggage trains. This battle saved Poland and Eastern Europe from German domination. Poland was able to survive for 300 years there-
