Lima Parish Paid Tribute On 100th Anniversary

The Holy Sacrifices performed in its most elaborate and solemn ceremonial, the Pontifical Mass, climaxed the celebration in St. Rose Church of the Centennial of the First Mass in the Lima parish.

The Most Rev. James E. Keane, D.D., Bishop of Rochester was the celebrant of the Mass. He was assisted by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, V.C., as assistant priest, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William F. Bergan, Chancellor, and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph S. Cameron, Pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, as Deacons of Honor. Rev. J. Joseph O'Connell, of Nazareth Academy, as Deacon of the Mass, and Rev. Edward K. Hall, pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Danville, sub-deacon.

Rev. Lawrence B. Casey of Rochester and Rev. Edward Lyons, President of St. Andrews Seminary, were first and second Masters of Ceremonies, respectively. The minor offices of the Mass were performed by the students of St. Andrews Seminary.

The music of the Mass was furnished also by the students of St. Andrews Seminary under the direction of Rev. Benedict Egan, St. Bernard Seminary.

Parish Loyalty

The spacious church edifice the beautiful interior of which was enhanced by floral decorations in keeping with the solemnity of the occasion, was filled with a congregation for the most part composed of the members of the parish. The devoted loyalty of St. Rose parishioners was manifested in the great numbers of former members of the parish who came from Rochester and the adjoining towns of Geneva, Danville, Rush, Canandaigua, Stanley, Hornell, Genesee, East Bloomfield, Mt. Morris and Honeyoy Falls, to participate in the event. A guard of honor of thirty members of the Nocturnal Adoration Society of St. Rose Church added to the impressiveness of the ceremonies.

After the Mass, a class of forty children received the Sacrament

of Confirmation from the hands of the Bishop.

Keep Spirit Alive

In his Justice sermon Bishop Keane referred to the sacrifices and the faith of the organizers and builders of the parish, and paid tribute to the present generation for having retained the spirit of the early parishioners and for having preserved in the past the gifts that were handed down to them.

He said that the history of the parish can not be measured by physical developments or material possessions, but must be judged solely on the relationship of each individual to his God.

His Excellency declared that in this relationship the real beauty of parochial history is created and is known only to God; for as the most beautiful inspirations of the poet cannot be expressed in words, the most beautiful mental images of the artist cannot be transferred to the canvas, the most touching harmony and melody in the mind of the musician cannot be translated to music, so the most beautiful part of parochial history escapes the chronicler of man but lives forever in the records of heaven.

The Bishop said that the dominant spirit of a centennial is undoubtedly one of thanksgiving, and that while we are thankful to God for the gifts of one hundred years, that at present, especially, we are appreciative of the gift of freedom of worship for which our nation is warring today, for which all of the citizens of the United States are sacrificing with the hope that the speedy coming of peace will establish securely and firmly a nation where man may follow his conscience and perform his duties as God and his reason dictate.
