Forty Hours Opens Sunday

AUBURN — The Forty Hours Devotion will open in St. Mary's Church next Sunday at the last Mass which will be celebrated at 12:00 o'clock. The services each evening will commence at 7:30 and the sermons at these devotions will be delivered by Rev. Donald M. Cleary, Catholic chaplain at Cornell University and former assistant pastor at Holy Family Church in Auburn. The hours of the Masses on Monday and Tuesday will be at 6, 7, 8 and 9 o'clock, and Masses on Wednesday morning will be said at 6, 7 and 8 o'clock. Confessions will be heard after the devotions on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday evenings and on Monday and Tuesday afternoons from 3:30 until 5:30. The solemn closing of the Forty Hours Devotion will take place on Tuesday evening.

This beautiful devotion is in memory of the forty hours during which the Body of Jesus lay in the sepulchre and is held in every Catholic Church and chapel once every year. The devotion was begun at Milan in 1534, and spread into other cities of Italy and was introduced into Rome for the first Sunday of every month by St. Philip Neri, in 1548.

The Forty Hours Devotion was established forever by Pope Clement VIII for the whole course of the year, in regular succession, from one church to another, commencing on the first Sunday in Advent. This Pope was moved to establish the devotion because of the public troubles of holy church in order that day and night, the faithful might appease their Lord by prayer before the Blessed Sacrament in solemn exposition imploring there His divine mercy.

The devotion has for its object the solemn adoration of Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, including thanksgiving, reparation, propitiation and impetration. The worship of Jesus in the Eucharist is the primary devotion of Holy Mother Church. The Forty Hours Devotion is precious because of the indulgences that are offered. A plenary indulgence may be gained once a day on each day during the Forty Hours Devotion by all who being truly repentant, confess their sins, receive Holy Communion, visit the Church in which the Blessed Sacrament is exposed and pray there for the intentions of the Holy Father. The prayers prescribed for this indulgence are the Our Father, Hail Mary and Glory be to the Father, six times.

A Partial Indulgence of fifteen years may be gained for each and every visit to a church in which the Blessed Sacrament is exposed for the Forty Hours Devotions. The prayers prescribed for this indulgence are the Our Father, Hail Mary and Glory, etc. six times.

These indulgences are applicable to the souls in purgatory. The sick can gain these indulgences if they perform some good work prescribed by their confessor. The confession may be made and Communion received on the morning before the exposition has taken place, or any day during the following week. If Communion be received in the church of exposition, and during the exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, this visit will answer for the one prescribed as necessary to gain the Plenary Indulgence.

Every parishioner should visit the church during the days of the Forty Hours Devotion to prove his love for the "Prisoner of Love".

Mass Time Changes
Your attention is called to the fact that the 11:00 o'clock Mass on Sunday, November 29th will be a Low Mass. The last Mass on Nov. 29, will be celebrated at 12:00 o'clock instead of the usual hour of 12:15. This change is made because of the Forty Hours Devotion, and will be for next Sunday only. The 12:00 o'clock Mass will be a Solemn High Mass followed by a procession.

SODALITY HOLY HOUR
The Sodality of Mary will conduct their annual Holy Hour before the Blessed Sacrament on Sunday from three until four in the afternoon. Each member of both sodalities is requested to attend this Holy Hour. The sodalists are offering their prayers, Holy Communion received during the Forty Hours and Masses attended for the intention of Pope Pius XII. This will represent St. Mary's part in the spiritual bouquet for the Holy Father's Christmas gift.

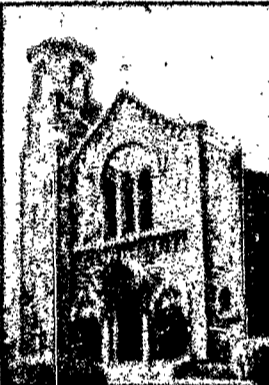
