GENEVA—Court Geneva of the Catholic Daughters of America celebrated its twenty-fourth birthday on Wednesday, Nov. 18, at Lewis Hall, the Woman's Building. Covers were laid for sixty-five members and guests.

Guest speaker for the dinner was Rev. R. Felix White of the Maryknoll Mission, who returned a few months ago from the mission field at Chuwa Korea. Father White was among the Americans expatriated from Japan on the liner Gripsholm.

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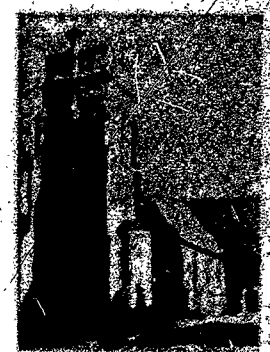
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
