Third Latin-American Lecture Set Dec. 10 At Nazareth Academy

In the setting of Aquinas Institute Auditorium and with the title of "The Indians and Missions of South America," Rev. Robert McNamara, M. A., Professor of Church History at St. Bernard's Seminary gave the second lecture in the series of Latin-American Forums being sponsored by Superintendent of Catholic Schools, The Rev. John M. Duffy.

Father McNamara brought out many interesting points in regard to the historical background of the Indians and Missions and also gave the listeners a clearer insight of the problems with which the early missionary had to contend.

The Rev. William Ferree, S. M., of the Dayton University, Dayton, Ohio who has recently spent several months in South America told of the Indians and Missions of South America as they are today. Thus, the audience received a complete picture of the Mission situation in South America.

The third lecture will be given by Sister Rose Marie Ph.D. of Nazareth College on Thursday Dec. 10 at Nazareth Academy. Sister has chosen for her topic, "The Culture of South America."

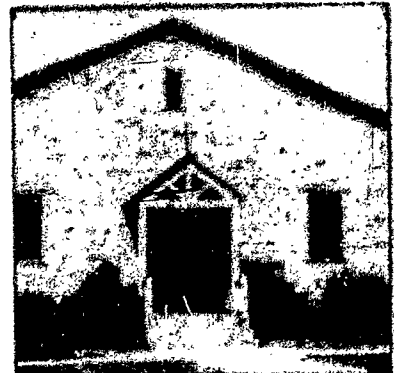

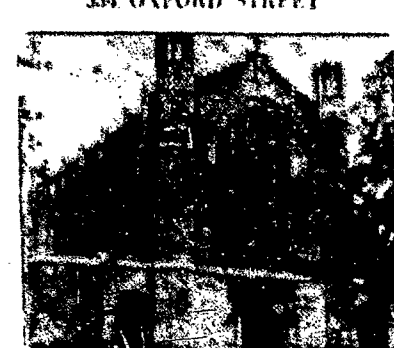

'Christian Democracy' In Ireland

Widespread interest in Christian Democracy, the development of which has been urged by His Holiness Pope Pius XII, is reflected in requests for publications on that subject distributed by the National Catholic Welfare Conference, according to the report of the N. C. W. C. Business and Publications Office.

The Office reports that demand continues for the "Oives Catechism on the Rights and Duties of Americans," but "sharing the limelight" with it are the more recent N. C. W. C. publications, the "Christian Democracy Series" and the "Faith and Freedom Series" of the Catholic University

of America. The total distribution of pamphlets was 15,000 copies greater than in the previous fiscal year.

Catholic Action monthly publication of the N. C. W. C. showed a steady increase in subscriptions, and was reported to have been in great demand by lay groups, public libraries, State and city libraries, non-Catholic college and university libraries.
