#### Non-Catholics At Service

OWEGO—A co-operative service was held in St. Patrick's Church on Sunday evening, and it was attended by the members of the various Non-Catholic churches in this village.

Some time ago a Village Council of Churches was formed by the ministers of the different churches and St. Patrick's joined the organization.

At the services, which was attended by a very large congregation, Father Hynes, Pastor, explained in a simple and most effective manner "What One Sees On Entering a Catholic Church."

Father Hynes gave a description of the altar, its meaning, and what composes an altar. He then described the various articles seen on a Catholic altar, especially during a Catholic service, and their meaning and relation to the particular service. He explained the use of the statues which are seen in our churches and how they are used by Catholics. He emphasized the fact that the statues are used to remind us of the deeds and lives of the saints and that those saints are our intercessors in heaven before the throne of God.

He also called attention to the Stations of the Cross and he told the congregation how the Stations are said and some of the prayers that are said by the person following the stations.

He advised the members of the other denominations that they were always welcome at any service in our churches, whether one of the nature of the Sunday evening one or any other service. Many favorable comments were expressed by those attending who are not members of St. Patrick's parish for the enlightening and interesting way in which many of our symbols of religion were explained by Father Hynes.
