Sane Words on Germany

In the midst of this "total" war total in many unexpected senses when some Americans are losing their moral bearings, chucking their standards of conduct and their humanitarian ideals, it is good to come across a sober, sensible book on Germany and the Germans Louis P Lochner's WHAT ABOUT GERMANY: is praised by Emil Lengyel who reviews it in the New York Times Book Review in these enthusiastic terms "Mr. Lochner's book is so informative and wise that it makes the reviewer despair of his ability to convey to the reader even a faint idea of its importance." Seldom if ever does the editor of the New York

Times Book Review permit a reviewer to 'go over-board' like that Stranger still now that Whack Germany seems to be the order of the day and when any suggestion that not all Germans are fiends is instantaneously damned as fifth column stuff Lochner's book and Langue's review make the point that not all Germans are raging rosting savages who must be not only conquered but exterminated. As a matter of fact there is a Fifth Column inside Germany composed of anti-Hitler Germans. I quote Lengyel's condensation of Lochner's statement: There is a Front of Decent People in the Reich, Lochner writes Its members share a secret sign known as the Deutscher Blick' (German look) they giance about furtively then duck their heads and begin to whisper Many are the members of this rout and they hate Hitler with the burning hatred that comes out of their direct knowledge of his unspeakable crimes and out of the deep shame that again it was their country that inflicted such a mouster upon the world. Under the Nazi reign of terror they cannot organize and, for the time being

at least they are impotent to act in concert."

And now Lochner himself "There are men of good-will in Germany, just as there are such men everywhere in the world In proportion as we en-courage such men with assurances that they too will have a share in the construction of a real New Order, in proportion as we furnish them with propaganda material and other aids for carrying on their struggle against Hitlerism, will the mistakes of Versailles be avoided, will this war be shortened, a quicker victory assured and the foundation laid for peace that will give promise of enduring.
