ST. PATRICK'S (Elmira)**NOVENA FOR SERVICEMEN**

An exceptionally beautiful ceremony took place on Monday, Dec. 2, when the dedication of the honor roll of 222 men and women from St. Patrick's parish now in the service of their country was concluded with the closing evening service of the nine-day Immaculate Conception Novena, conducted for their intentions from Nov. 29 to Dec. 8.

"God must be in this picture," said the Rev. Justin Mahoney, O.F.M., in the last of a series of very effective and forceful sermons. Speaking of the victorious peace for which we hope, he said: "It is our duty to thank however, we must be certain that God is on our side . . . the only way to accomplish this is to stay on His side. We are called to active service in a spirit of peace." Father Mahoney closed his sermon with a recitation to the Blessed Virgin "for those whom we dedicate and consecrate to thee tonight, under the banner of thy Immaculate Heart." He then bestowed the papal blessing on the kneeling congregation.

A procession of school children wearing red, white and blue marched to the sanctuary, where the altar was decorated with red roses and white asters, with the candles on each side of the tabernacle arranged in the form of a "V." There the boys assembled in the form of a cross, while the girls shaped a victory "V." Miss Rita Dailey, from the Seventh Grade of St. Patrick's School, offered a prayer for our soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses in service.

The Rev. William J. Brien then blessed the honor roll and the service flag; he expressed the hope that parishioners would continue to pray as they have done during this novena for the men in service. The Soldiers' Hymn was sung by the school children, and the service closed with Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament. The celebrant was Father Brien, assisted by the Rev. Francis J. Pugnat, deacon, Rev. John Murphy, sub-deacon, and Rev. William A. Burns, master of ceremonies.

**DR. MAHONEY ASKS BETTER
UNDERSTANDING OF
STUDENTS' WAR PROBLEMS**

BROOKLYN.—A plea for a more sympathetic understanding of the problems besetting college students in a war-torn world and anxious to do their part in the defense of their country was voiced by the Rev. Dr. William J. Mahoney, C.M., as he began his administration as twelfth president of St. John's University, Brooklyn.

Dr. Mahoney said that all plans must inevitably be subservient and contributive to the paramount national plan of American victory. "It is the purpose of any college, as every other social agency, to further our war efforts," he said. "The large as well as the small college, and professional and the arts school have all contributed their share to the democratic processes of the American way of life. They have served our country in days of peace and can well serve it in times of war."

**Report 155 Priests
Lost in Ship Sinking**

LONDON—KAP, Polish Catholic press agency here, has learned that 155 Catholic priests, released from prison camps on Soviet islands in the Arctic Ocean, were lost when the ship on which they were departing was torpedoed.

Information available to KAP indicates that 55 priests are free in Russia, 18 have been sent with the Polish Army to Persia and with children to India, 32 are in prison and places of forced residence, and 102 are in concentration camps.

Fourth in Navy

CHICAGO.—When the Rev. John Ireland Gaffey, pastor of St. Joseph's church at Manhattan, Ill., leaves to become a navy chaplain he will be the fourth member of his family to serve in the navy. Father Gaffey has three brothers, all graduates of the U. S. Naval Academy, who hold commissions. Their grandfather, William O'Brien, was one of the early mayors of Chicago.
