Mr. McGarr was 80 years old. He first worked for the Associated Press and later was secretary to United States Senator Roscoe Conkling. He entered the state service as secretary-stenographer.

Mr. Garr reported the proceedings of the International Medical Congress as official stenographer in 1887. He wrote several booklets on state hospital methods and systems and on his experiences abroad. He was appointed secretary of the Lunacy Commission upon its organization in 1889 serving until 1914 when he became executive officer of the commission's joint purchasing board. After the creation of the central supplies committee in 1919 Mr. McGarr represented the hospital commission on the committee. In 1912 he became treasurer of the State Hospital System, a position which he held until his retirement in 1931.

He was president of St. Vincent's Conference of St. Vincent de Paul's Church, Albany and a member of the Royal Arcanum and the Knights of Columbus in Albany.

Mr. McGarr is survived by a daughter, Mrs. T. Manning Crimes and a son, Philip N. McGarr of Albany. William J. and Victor J. Callanan of Auburn are nephews. A brother, John McGarr, died two years ago at his home in Chicago. Both Mr. McGarr and his brother left Auburn when they were young men.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS CAMPAIGN TO BUY PLANE FOR U. S. AIR FORCES


MANCHESTER, N. H.—Through the efforts of two seniors at St. Joseph's High School here, the United States air forces are likely to receive a new combat plane bearing the name of the school, some day in the summer of 1937.

A goal of \$75,000 has been set to be raised among 110 students and their families in a campaign launched by John Macdonald and Leonard P. Keenan.

Their first drive was to sell enough war stamps to purchase a \$1,000 reconnaissance car as a Christmas gift for the armed forces. By Nov. 15 this goal had been reached and the following day before a new goal could be announced, another \$1,000 in bonds had been sold.

By Thanksgiving Day, when the campaign was only 30 days old, a total of \$11,218 in bonds had been purchased. The youthful salesman immediately announced the \$75,000 combat plane drive for the winter and spring months.

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
