

Navy Chaplain Lauds Home Training of Men At Sampson

GENEVA—About 150 mothers and fathers of the school children of St. Stephen's parish and other guests attended a meeting of the St. Stephen's Parent-Teacher Association on Thursday Dec. 10, in the parish house when Lieut. E. B. LeGault, USNR, Senior chaplain of the United States Naval Training Station at Sampson, was guest speaker.

Lieutenant LeGault is a member of the Jesuit Order and before volunteering as a chaplain he was a teacher at Santa Clara University, San Francisco University and Gonzaga University. Before coming to Geneva he was on the staff of Seattle College, the only co-educational Jesuit college in the United States.

The program was opened with selections played by the St. Stephen's School Band under the direction of the band master, C. H. McChamber. The band which was organized only a few years ago under the sponsorship of the St. Stephen's Parent-Teacher Association gave a fine program.

Outlines Training
Lieutenant LeGault opened his address by outlining the life of a naval recruit from the time he arrives at Sampson to the time of his assignment to a group or battalion. He outlined the drills, tests and specialized training which are given the men.

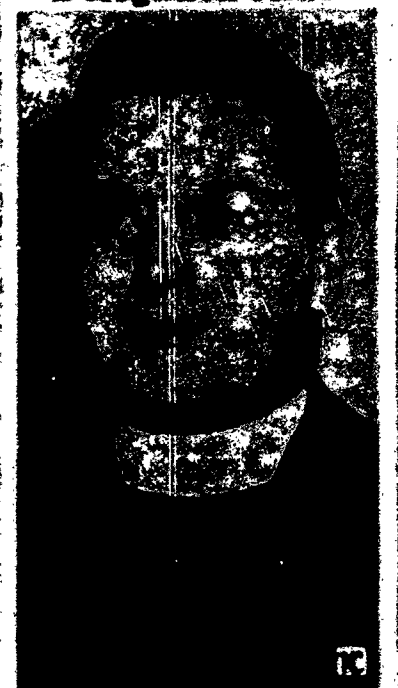
The bride was graduated with honors on Sunday afternoon, Dec. 13th, from William Smith College at the first mid-year convocation.

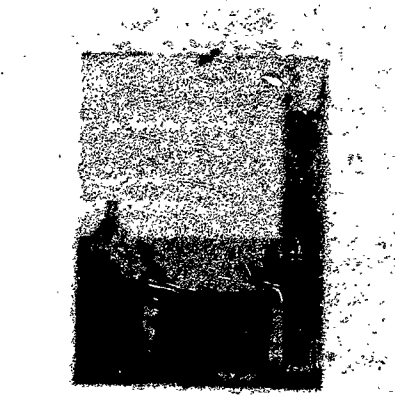
