

Bishop, Mayor First To Contribute Blood

KANSAS CITY, The Most Reverend Edward V. O'Hara, Bishop of Kansas City, and Mayor John W. Clegg were the first two contributors of

a pint of blood each to the blood bank set up by the Red Cross in Kansas City.

Following the Bishop and the Mayor were 150 other civic and religious leaders of the city who added their contributions to the new blood bank, which has been set at 1,000 pints a week for one year for Kansas Citizens.
