The Holy Father said "tranquility and feverish activity" are not opposed to each other, but rather form a well-balanced pair for him who is inspired by the beauty and urgency of the spiritual foundations of society, and of the nobility of its ideals.

He appealed to young people, "who are wont to turn your backs on the past, and to rely on the future for your aspirations and your hopes," to fight for the eternal laws of God and for the dignity of the human person.

The five points for the order and pacification of human society laid down by His Holiness are:

"The Dignity and Rights of the Human Person."

"The Defense of Social Unity and Especially of the Family in Principle."

"The Dignity and Prerogatives of Labor."

"The Rehabilitation of the Juridic Order."

"The Conception of the State According to the Christian Spirit."

### Allied Landings Free 18 Clerics in Africa

LONDON (NC) Freed as the result of landings by United States and British troops in North Africa 18 English-speaking White Fathers, along with seven deacons and four students in Minor Orders, have arrived in this country.

They were at Carthage, center of the White Fathers' work in Africa, when German and Italian troops occupied the towns of Tunisia.

French authorities gave the group a special train to the frontier and the British saw to it that they reached home safely.

### Bishop Kearney Opens Catholic College Congress With Mass

CINCINNATI — Catholic college students' views on "Victory In War and In Peace" were brought out at the Catholic Collegiate Congress held here at the Gibson Hotel, Dec. 27 to 30 in which an impressive gathering of the U. S. hierarchy participated.

A Pontifical Mass celebrated by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester and Episcopal Moderator of the Newman Club Federation, formally opened the Congress on Monday, Dec. 28.

The sermon at the Mass was preached by His Excellency, the Most Rev. Samuel A. Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago.

Taking part in the various sessions were members of the National Federation of Catholic College Students and of the National Federation of Newman Clubs.

Serving as Honorary Chairman at a Tuesday morning session was His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, with the Rev. Donald M. Cleary of Cornell University, Ithaca, National Chaplain of the N. C. F., acting in the same capacity in an afternoon session. Arthur McTaggart of Cornell University was chairman of the latter session.

LONDON — They call it their "target for the week"—and it hits a bull's-eye of cheeriness in the midst of the sordid business of war.

They are the children of a Teeside parish school here and each week they have a Mass said for their own intention — which they have styled "target for the week." Last week they chose to remember the prisoners of war throughout the world.

In past weeks, the children have remembered in their weekly Mass the needs and welfare of soldiers, sailors, airmen, merchant seamen and others engaged in the conduct of war.

The crusade of the children seems to light when they sent a delegation to an army chaplain, requesting him to say the Mass for the prisoners.

### Urges Safeguards For Ruins in Mexico

MEXICO CITY.—The Rev. Florencio Garcia, pastor at Tepic, a town near Tasco in the State of Guerrero, has informed the Institute of Anthropology and History regarding certain archeological ruins reported to have been discovered in that vicinity. Father Garcia suggests that the proper officials investigate and prevent removal of jewels and other valuables said to be in the ruins of a temple.

### 1943 Catholic Almanac Out

WASHINGTON. Thirty seventh annual publication of the National Catholic Almanac, number 800 pages, and released this week by the publishers, St. Anthony's Guild Press, Paterson, N. J., centers attention on World War II and its relation to things Catholic.

Compiled by the Franciscan Clerics, of Holy Name College, here, the 1943 edition of Catholic information, contains "A Short History of Anti-Catholicism in the United States" and "Descriptions of the World's Famous Cathedrals" among its new sections, while the previous material has been brought up to date. The volume also contains a daily war chronology, an American Martyrology; biographical sketches of

Church's stand on labor, National Catholic Community Service, Social Security and other subjects in the 2,500 index titles.

Under the revised "Patron Saints" section, St. Peter Baptist, a Franciscan Missionary, is listed as the Patron of Japan, where he was crucified by order of the Japanese emperor on February 5, 1597.
