Sister William David, who has been on a teaching assignment at the Society's school for natives in Kailua, Honolulu, reported she recently saw her brother, Joseph Donovan, for the first time in five years when he stopped over in Honolulu while moving with a

daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Kettle, of Pasadena, Calif., hadn't seen any members of her family. Recently she was surprised when her brother in the uniform of a U. S. Navy Ensign, appeared at the door of the convent.

In 1938, Sister Marie Estelle, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Coupe, of Lonsdale, R. I., left this country for a teaching assignment in Hawaii. Recently she reported, she was reunited with her brother, serving with the U. S. Navy who was one of the survivors of Pearl Harbor. His duties keep him in Hawaii and he is a frequent visitor at the convent where she is stationed.

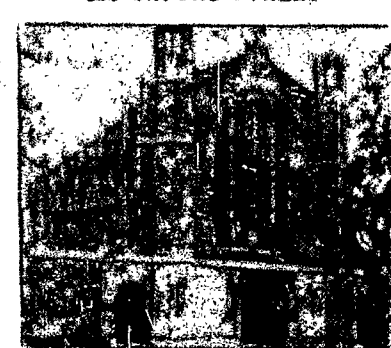

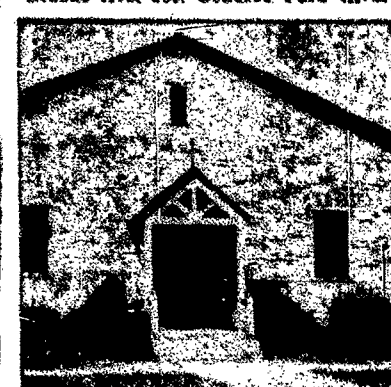

# Notes Women's Role Widening

WASHINGTON.—The enlarged part which women will play in American life by reason of the war was stressed by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Patrick J. McCormick, Acting Rector of the Catholic University of America, in addressing the biennial conference of the local chapter of the International Federation of Catholic Alumnae, of which he is director.

"This war has already opened up new careers for women," Msgr. McCormick said. "With the continuance of hostilities even wider opportunities will be available in the professions, in industry, in government service and in public life. One can readily see what will happen when even greater numbers of men are called to serve in the armed forces. Their positions in industry, in the professions, and in

government will have to be taken over by women. This means that women available for such services will have to be prepared and much of this preparation will depend upon the schools.

"When college men will be called in greater numbers, as we expect they will, there will be a preponderance of women receiving college training. This suggests that there will be more potential leadership among women students than heretofore. The colleges must become conscious of this situation, and the possibilities it holds out for the future."
