People's Cooperation In War Effort Grows, School Office Reports

According to a memorandum just received from the Treasury Department extra time is allowed for the completion of the Schools-At-War Scrapbooks with Feb. 1 set as the deadline for schools in the District of Columbia.

The scrapbooks furnished by the Treasury Department give each school of the country an opportunity to record their reports in stamps and bond activities as well as other war time efforts made by the children.

Although the deadline has been postponed, early contributions are in to the Office of the Superintendent and show a very high record of stamps and bonds and an enthusiastic spirit for all-out cooperation in war effort.

All scrapbooks from schools in the district will be forwarded to the Office of Education Office where they will be reviewed individually and judged.

The Superintendent's Office is receiving these days contributions of the children from their classes in many of the New York City, Pa., schools from Washington and Monroe County are sending their offerings directly to the Superintendent's Office. These will be in the local Red Cross Chapter.

In addition to these activities boys and girls are busy engaged in holiday savings projects. Boys are out on a four-to-four campaign for post-war 2 1/2 inches wide or over, while girls are collecting old and nylon hose. The results of these campaigns are being turned in directly to the public centers designated for their collection.
