Parish Priest Makes Credit Union Pay

SHEET HARBOR, N. S.—Labors of the priesthood are sufficient to keep the most active of men busy, but the Rev. Father J. Johnson, local parish priest, has found time to head the successful operation of a public credit union and general co-operative unit.

Started originally as a cooperative banking venture only, the union recently expanded to open a cooperative general store, where merchandise of all variety is available to union members. The union and store has the cooperation of the chief local industry, the Halifax Paper and Pulp Co. The union recently voted a 3 per cent interest to shareholders and a 15 per cent rebate to borrowers.

Polish Priest Dies In Nazi Prison

LONDON.—The death in a Nazi prison of Father Szramak, distinguished Polish priest, is reported in information received here by the Polish Catholic Press Agency KAP. Another priest, it was stated, has been sentenced to ten years of hard labor. He is identified as Canon Matej. Two priests, the information stated, were among 50 Warsaw hostages condemned to death.

Notes Women's Role Widening

WASHINGTON.—The enlarged part which women will play in American life by reason of the war was stressed by the Rt. Rev. Monsignor Patrick J. McCormick, Acting Rector of the Catholic Uni-

versity of America, in addressing the annual convocation of the local chapter of the International Federation of Catholic Alumnae, of which he is director.

"This war has already opened up new careers for women," Monsignor McCormick said. "With the new expansion of business since war-time opportunities will be available in the professions, in industry, in government service and in public life. One day it will not only be women who will support what were formerly regarded as men's jobs, but women will be called on to serve in the armed forces. These positions, in industry, in the professions, and in government will have to be taken over by women. This means that women available for such service will have to be prepared and equipped. This preparation will depend upon the schools.

Urges Mothers of Small Children To Stay Home

NEW YORK.—Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins, speaking at a conference of the New York Women's Trade Union League, urged women with young children to remain at home rather than enter the war work.

The principal complaint of employers in war industries, Secretary Perkins said, in connection with the employment of women, is the high absentee rate, chiefly among very young women, and those who have children.
