Fervor of U. S. Troops On Various Fronts Draws Praise From Chaplains

A story of thronged religious services aboard transports carrying American troops to North Africa is told by Chaplains Thomas J. Manley of Rochester, N. Y., and James P. Flynn of Crookston, Minn.

"On the transport coming over, Father Manley writes "Father Walsh and I said Mass in the library every day and on deck every Sunday using one of Msgr. O'Donnell's ship's altars. The Masses were always crowded."

Father Flynn reports that at sea, Confessions, Communion and attendance at Sunday and daily Masses increased. "I've learned by my own experience the vital need for Catholic chaplains on transports," he adds. "Several in this huge convoy have no chaplains, let alone Padres, and the number of 'long turners' or 'big fish' who have come back to the Sacraments since I've been aboard would justify my becoming a priest if I had never done anything else."

Father James E. McEvoy of Brooklyn, N. Y., reports the remarkable return of many hundreds to the practice of their holy Faith in North Africa as "our Christmas gift to Christ."

Sailors At Masses

Father George Rosta, Chaplain at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station in Illinois, tells of large turnouts for weekday Masses there. "I do not think that one of us has been able to be in Mass on time during the week because of the large number of men each morning who wish to go to Confession," he says. "Our daily Communion are most inspiring and consoling."

Commends Turnout

The outpouring of faith in the Hawaiian Islands "would do your heart good," an Army lieutenant writes to the Most Rev. John F. O'Hara, C.S.C., Military Delegate. "On Sundays one can't get into the chapel and there is also a goodly attendance at the midweek services," the officer says, adding: "It is a great consolation to know that we all have one Faithful Friend and often times, when I am puzzled as to what to do, I find the answer—in prayer and concentration."

Lauds Australians

Tribute to the "fine" faith of Australian Catholics is paid by Father Anselm Keefe, O. Praem., Army chaplain, who writes from the Island-Continent. "When I read in the American Catholic papers the encomiums paid by the Australian clergy to the American Catholic soldiers," he says, "I wonder why no one men-

tions what fine Catholics the Australians are. It is a rare Sunday when 50 per cent of the Australians at Mass do not receive Holy Communion."

Father Keefe reports that American troops in Australia "have set a fine standard of gentlemanly behavior and are in every word a true example of real Americanism." But in the evaluation of the Australian Catholic clergy, he adds, "we are missing a note which should be sounded. It is a tribute to the strong, deep and solid Catholicism that this same Australian Catholic clergy has fostered on the Island Continent."

Troops Turn Out

Weather cold and unfavorable locations do not hinder American troops in Great Britain from attending Mass, even on weekdays, reports Father Patrick B. Fay, Army chaplain from New York. "I am encouraged and edified by the turnout of men in the early hours and in trying circumstances," he writes. "Warm-hearted cooperation has been experienced on the part of the officers."
