

Schools-At-War Scrapbook Deadline Set For February 1

Pupils' Cooperation In War Effort Grows, School Office Reports

According to a pronouncement just received from the Treasury Department, extra time is allowed for the completion of the Schools-At-War Scrapbooks, with Feb. 1 set as the deadline for schools in the Diocese of Rochester.

The scrapbooks furnished by the Treasury Department, give each school of the country an opportunity to record their reports on stamps and bond activity as well as other war time efforts made by the children.

Although the deadline has been postponed, early contributions sent in to the Office of the Superintendent show a very high record of stamps and bonds and an energetic spirit for all-out cooperation in war effort.

All Scrapbooks from schools in the diocese will be forwarded to the Catholic Education Office where they will be reviewed individually and judged.

The Superintendent's Office is receiving these days contributions of the children from their Christmas money for the Red Cross War Fund. Schools from Rochester and Monroe County are sending their offerings directly to the Superintendent's Office, those outside, to the local Red Cross Chapters.

In addition to these activities boys and girls are busily engaged in holiday salvage projects. Boys are out on a door-to-door canvass for paint brushes 2 inches wide or over, while girls are collecting silk and nylon hose. The results of these campaigns are being turned in directly to the public centers designated for their collection.

Chaplain Hanna Celebrates First Midnight Mass At Army College Christmas Eve

WASHINGTON (NC) — Midnight Mass for the first time was celebrated early today at the historic Army War College here in the Nation's Capital by the first member of the Army Corps of Chaplains ever assigned to that military institution.

A feature of the solemn service was the singing of a group of Franciscan students for the first time from the Holy Name College. The group, for half an hour prior to the Mass, sang a special program dealing with the life of St. Francis, which embodied all the familiar Catholic Christmas motifs.

The Mass was celebrated in one of the temporary buildings on the spacious college grounds and more than 500 officers and soldiers attended. Celebrant of the Mass was the Rev. Austin A. Hanna, who holds the rank of captain in the Army Corps of Chaplains. Father Hanna is from the Diocese of Rochester, and was assigned to the Army War College post last May. The Franciscan choir also sang the Gregorian chants of the Mass. All Religious Groups Participate in Day Of Prayer in India

MADRAS (NC) — Representatives of all religious groups participated in a Day of Prayer held here. Ceremonies in the Victoria Hall were presided over by the Governor of the Province, Sir Arthur Hope who spoke on the necessity of prayer.

The first prayer, offered by a Hindu devotee, was followed by a hymn sung by the Catholics. A prayer by a representative of Islam was followed by a Hindu song. The Most Rev. Ludwig Madala, Archbishop of Mysore, then offered Catholic prayers, followed by a representative of the Parsi community, who in turn was followed by Archbishop Clarke representing the Protestant groups. Next came representatives of the Chinese community and the Theosophists. A second hymn was then sung by the Catholics.

Most Rev. Thomas O'Donnell, S.M., Archbishop of Wellington, N. Z., born, March 12, 1870, in San Francisco, Cal. Moved to New Zealand with his parents when nine months old. Educated there and ordained a priest of the Society of Mary, in 1892. On January 21, 1894-95, Pastoral work, Archbishop of Wellington, 1897-1912; appointed Vicar General, 1897. Named Titular Bishop of Orléans, May 2, 1913, and appointed Coadjutor Archbishop of Wellington, O. J. S. Consecrated, Aug. 17, 1913, at Wellington by Archbishop Redwood, S. M. Succeeded to the metropolitan See of Wellington, Jan. 3, 1915. (N.C.W.C.)
